5 On 06/05/2025, at approximately 1416hrs., there was a call for service created by dispatch at 266 Keisner Rd., in

17 Later, I learned from surveillance footage, BWC and interviews that this entry correlates to Cpl Brown and Cpl.
18 Anderson being directed to the vehicle the subject arrived at the Bear River Community Center campus in.***

30 Once it was verified an Officer Involved Shooting had occurred, Inv. Taylor began contacting allied agencies to
31 activate a CIRT response. Briefing of the incident occurred at the Major Crimes Division of the Humboldt County
32 Sheriff's Office.

33
34 During the briefing, CIRT members viewed Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown's body worn camera footage. In
35 reviewing the BWC of both Corporal's they appear to be located on the unfinished section of Kiesner Rd, near
36 the intersection of Brenard Dr. in the Bear River tribal Complex.

37
38 In this video the Corporals can be seen getting out of their vehicles to speak with a male subject that had just
39 driven passed them in the unfinished section of Kiesner Rd. The subject got out of his vehicle once it stopped.
40 No other occupants are seen in the subject's vehicle. The Corporals began to speak with the subject, who was
41 standing next to his vehicle. The subject reached into his pants pocket, pulled out a folding knife and
42 immediately opened it up. The subject held the knife with the blade towards the Corporals in a position to

1 conduct a downward strike, the arm motion would be similar to swinging a hammer. The blade being on the
2 little-finger side of his hand. The Corporals immediately began to give the subject commands to drop the knife.
3 The subject began to walk around the patrol vehicles towards the Corporals, which were parked next to each
4 other, driver side door-to-driver side door. The Corporals began to walk backwards, with their firearms drawn,
5 giving the subject verbal commands as he walks toward them. The subject began to walk towards Cpl Anderson
6 as Cpl. Anderson was walking backwards. The subject began to run towards Cpl. Anderson with the knife still in
7 his hand and Cpl. Anderson fired three shots at the subject and fell to the ground. The Corporals then
8 handcuffed the subject on the ground and began to provide first aid, including CPR.

9
10 The subject was transported to Redwood Memorial Hospital where he was pronounced decease. The subject
11 was later identified by Deputy Coroner VanBuskirk, as [REDACTED]

12
13 After the briefing, I assigned personnel to various tasks that needed to be completed. Each task was conducted
14 with two or more investigators. These teams were also comprised of investigators/detectives working from
15 different agencies.

18 **Scene:**

19
20 DAI Bise and I responded to the scene at approximately 1739hrs. While at this location we were briefed by Inv.
21 Taylor and other units who were on scene. The scene was being processed by investigative personnel, so DAI
22 Bise and I conducted a limited walk-thru of the scene, as to not disturb the evidence collection process. The
23 scene was photographed and 3D scanned by California Department of Justice personnel [REDACTED] and
24 [REDACTED] and Eureka Police Department Evidence Technician [REDACTED]. Please refer to their attached
25 reports for further information.
26

27 This area, the intersection of Kiesner/Bernard, is within the property boundaries of the Bear River Rancheria and
28 located across Singley Hill Rd. from the Bear River Casino, 11 Bear Paws Way in Loleta. This is a multiple acre
29 complex, with several large commercial buildings, which includes the community center, recreation center,
30 family fun center, and tobacco shop. The entire area is under surveillance and monitored by the casino
31 surveillance team. This area consisted of two incident locations.
32

33 The primary incident location, where the shooting transpired, consists of a paved 4-way intersection with
34 Brenard Rd., traveling north-south and Kieser Rd., travelling east-west. This area also has improved curbs,
35 gutters and sidewalks in all directions. The east portion of Keiser Rd. stops after approximately 80 ft. The area
36 surrounding this portion of Kieser Rd., is semi-flat sloped grass/shrubs that appear to be mowed regularly. The
37 shooting incident began on the east portion of Kiesner Rd. and concluded on the south roadway grassy area
38 where Cpl. Anderson fired his weapon.
39

40 The two patrol vehicles were parked on this dead-end portion of Keiser Rd. One vehicle, later identified as the
41 vehicle Cpl. Brown was driving, was facing west towards the intersection. The second vehicle, driven by Cpl.
42 Anderson was facing east. The vehicles were parked in the shape of a "V" pattern, window-to-window, which is

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1 positioned if both drivers are talking to each other while seated in the vehicle. [REDACTED] vehicle is parked
2 southeast of Cpl. Anderson's vehicle, approximately 20-30 feet away.

3
4 The secondary scene was in front of the Tobacco Traders, 260 Keisner Rd., Loleta and was located on Kiesner Rd.
5 This scene consisted of a fourth vehicle, a [REDACTED] Ford F-350 that was parked near the entrance to the
6 Tobacco Traders. This vehicle was driven by a citizen and was struck by a bullet when Cpl. Anderson fired his
7 weapon. No citizens were injured during this incident. This area was cordoned off by police tape. It was towed
8 by Inv. Taylor as evidence to be processed at a later time. Refer to Inv. Taylor's supplemental report for further
9 details. The occupants were later interviewed by investigators also and those reports are attached.

10
11 While on scene, I learned that [REDACTED] had showered in the Recreation Center's locker room and I requested
12 law enforcement conduct a search of that location. The Bear River Recreation Center is located at 265 Keisner
13 Rd. The Recreation Center is within eyesight of the shooting location and approximately 0.1 of a miles away
14 according to Google Maps. HCSO Sgt. Filippini oversaw the search of this area and the other law enforcement
15 officer that assisted him. Refer to his supplemental report for further details. Arcata PD Evidence Technician
16 [REDACTED] collected evidence from that location also. Please refer to her attached supplemental report for further
17 details.

19 **INTERVIEWS:**

20
21 *****The following interview(s) are summarized below. Those summaries are written for reader comprehension
22 and not necessarily in the order the information provided. A combination of A.I. report writing, transcription
23 software and traditional methods were used to assist in the writing the summaries. I reviewed all A.I.
24 assistance for accuracy. All interviews were recorded and copies of those recordings were later booked into
25 evidence unless otherwise noted. For further details please refer to those recordings.*****

26
27 *****Some interviews were transcribed using an A.I. transcription service the Humboldt County Sheriff's
28 contracts with which is called "Netscribe." Filler words, (um, uh, ah, like, you know, so, well), and/or discourse
29 markers, (so, well, but, actually, frankly, I mean, you know, right, okay), are sometimes omitted by the
30 software. If during my review, I found the word missing and it being a necessary part of the statement, I
31 added it to the transcript, otherwise it was left out. An example of this would be answering a yes/no question
32 or confirming a statement with a "uh huh" meaning yes, or "right" as meaning correct. Those interviews are
33 described and noted below. The transcription(s) are attached.*****

34
35 Throughout this investigation I was provided several names of citizens that may have had contact with [REDACTED]
36 prior to the shooting. I was also provided with information that [REDACTED] could have possibly been detained on a
37 [REDACTED] from Redwood Memorial Hospital. This information was provided to me by either fellow
38 CIRT investigators or HCSO staff.

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HUMBOLDT COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

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NARRATIVE - Lead Investigator report

1 [REDACTED] had contacted HCSO at approximately 2100hrs., on 06/05/2025 reporting that he had seen an article
2 about the incident at Bear River. [REDACTED] believed he gave the subject a ride from Eureka to Redwood Memorial
3 Hospital. Further, [REDACTED] reported that the subject had a large injury to his arm and would not tell [REDACTED] how he
4 got the injury. [REDACTED] was paid \$105 for the ride by the subject.

5
6 On 06/09/2025, at approximately 1052hrs., DAI Bise and I spoke with [REDACTED] in the MCD interview room of the
7 HCSO. [REDACTED] was in the neighborhood where his family owns a house [REDACTED] when he was contacted
8 by neighbor [REDACTED] to ask if he would give a person a ride to Fortuna for \$100. [REDACTED] lives at [REDACTED]
9 [REDACTED] in Eureka, CA. [REDACTED] agreed and drove the subject to Redwood Memorial Hospital at approximately
10 1205hrs., on 06/05/2025. The subject was male and had an injury to his left arm. [REDACTED] described the subject as
11 possibly being in his 20's, approximately 6 foot tall, shoulder length dark brown curly hair, facial hair with a clean
12 complexion. [REDACTED] was not sure what the subject was wearing, except for wearing short sleeved shirt since he
13 could see the subject's bandage. The bandage was on the subject's left arm and blood was soaking through the
14 bandage. The subject would not tell him how the injury happened. The subject advised he was from [REDACTED] or
15 Southern California and asked [REDACTED] how to travel east. [REDACTED] did not know why the subject's vehicle was in
16 Fortuna.

17
18 [REDACTED] described that when they arrived at Redwood Memorial Hospital there happened to be a police vehicle
19 there, which made the subject uneasy. [REDACTED] stated something was troubling the subject, but [REDACTED] did not try
20 to find out what.

21
22 [REDACTED] later spoke with [REDACTED] on the phone and learned this subject was a stranger, not a family friend like he
23 had thought.

24
25 [REDACTED] explained [REDACTED] had a picture of the subject on surveillance footage, which was later determined to be
26 Ring camera footage.

27
28 [REDACTED] stated the subject paid him \$100 for the ride and gave him an extra \$5 for gas.

29
30 The interview with [REDACTED] was digitally recorded and a copy was booked into evidence as item #59, code 1949-8

31
32 [REDACTED]

33
34 On 06/09/2025, at approximately 1350hrs., DAI Bise and I spoke with [REDACTED] inside the MCD
35 interview room located at 826 4th St., in Eureka, CA. [REDACTED] lives at [REDACTED], in Eureka. This
36 residence is located near the St. Joseph's Hospital campus at 2700 Dolbeer St., in Eureka. [REDACTED] voluntarily
37 provided a statement to DAI Bise and I regarding a suspicious individual she encountered on the morning of
38 06/05/2025. [REDACTED] had seen the HCSO press release regarding the subject being involved in an OIS. Seeing
39 that it was the same subject she had dealings with earlier [REDACTED] contacted HCSO.

40
41 [REDACTED] reported that around 11:00 a.m., a man emerged from the greenbelt area behind her home and
42 walked onto her property. His behavior alarmed her—he stared at her with a "serious look" in his eyes and began

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1 to charge her fence, which is approximately 4 foot tall, with clenched fists. [REDACTED] explained the fence
2 would be easy for the subject to get over.

3
4 [REDACTED] described the man as a white male, medium-to-muscular build, with wavy dark hair and some facial
5 hair. He wore a reddish-orange shirt and brown pants. A bandage on his left forearm was soaked in blood, and
6 he appeared to be holding something in his hand, possibly a dirt clod with something sticking out of it.

7
8 Feeling threatened, [REDACTED] retreated into her house, locked the door, and called 911. She later saw a photo
9 of the man in a news report about the shooting and recognized him as the same individual she had encountered.

10 [REDACTED] provided photos from her phone showing the man on her property and shared them with me. I used
11 [REDACTED] phone and emailed those photographs to my work email address.

12
13 [REDACTED] emphasized the man's behavior was not typical of local transients or drug users and described his
14 expression as "stoic" and "blank." She had never seen him before and believed the interaction could be a
15 valuable timeline reference in the ongoing investigation.

16
17 With [REDACTED] permission, I used her cellphone and emailed the pictures to myself. Those photographs
18 were later booked into evidence as item #64, code 1949-10. The subject in those photographs was [REDACTED]

19 [REDACTED]
20
21 The interview with [REDACTED] was digitally recorded and a copy was booked into evidence as item #59, code
22 1949-8

23
24 [REDACTED] recontacted approximately 1 1/2-2months later indicating she had located some St. Joseph medical
25 supplies in the greenbelt behind her residence that appeared to belong to [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] advised she had
26 taken photographs of the items and would email me the pictures. As of the 08/21/2025, I have not received an
27 email from [REDACTED]. Based upon what she described (generally a medical gown, medical id tag, and iv leads)
28 I do not believe the items have any significant evidentiary value to this investigation.

29
30 **HCSO Corporal Bradford Anderson:**

31
32 The interview was audio recorded, and a copy of that recording was later booked into evidence as item #56, code
33 1949-5.

35 • Hire date: 2016
36 • PIN number: 2094
37 • HCCF: 1 year
38 • Currently Assigned: Corporal/FTO on patrol
39 • Shift: Monday-Wednesday every other Thursday 0600-1800hrs.
40 • Cpl. Anderson is assigned to Main Station Patrol which is an uniformed position.
41 • Cpl Anderson's normal patrol shift was 06/05/2025.
42 • Cpl. Anderson was driving a marked Humboldt County Sheriff's Office patrol vehicle.

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- 1 • Cpl Anderson slept the night before the interview, and he estimated he got a "spotty" 5 hours of slept.
- 2 • Cpl. Anderson considered his sleep before the incident normal getting approximately 7 hours of sleep.
- 3 • Issued Firearm: Glock 17 serial [REDACTED] w/16+1 rounds
- 4 o Streamlight TLR-1HL
- 5 o two additional magazines loaded with 16rds according to statement

6 On 06/10/2025, at approximately 1400hrs., DAI Richard Bise and I spoke with Cpl. Anderson in the MCD
7 conference room. Also present in the interview was Attorney [REDACTED] from law firm Raines, Lucia and
8 Stern representing Cpl Anderson. Cpl Anderson and his attorney reviewed Cpl. Anderson's BWC footage prior to
9 the interview. At the start of the interview, I provided Cpl. Anderson with the Beheler admonishment, and he
10 agreed to speak with us. Cpl. Anderson's attorney also recorded the interview. Cpl. Anderson was the only law
11 enforcement officer to fire his weapon during this incident.

12
13 During the initial portion of the interview Cpl. Anderson was shown a picture taken of him by investigators
14 shortly after the incident. In this picture Cpl. Anderson was wearing an outer-carrier vest. This style of vest
15 contains his body armor plates, various duty gear, a name tag identifying who he is, and name placard with the
16 word "Sheriff" written on his chest. However, there was no Sheriff badge, metal or cloth, of his left breast. I
17 questioned Cpl. Anderson about this trying to determine if he was not wearing a badge or if it fell off sometime
18 during his shift or the incident. Cpl. Anderson indicated that he wasn't wearing a badge because he had taken it
19 off Wednesday for concealed carry and forgot to replace it on his vest.

20
21 Cpl. Anderson was also shown a Google Map overhead of the area to assist in identifying certain locations
22 discussed in the interview. Both the map and photograph were booked into evidence as item #49, code 1949-2.

23
24 **Background and Initial Dispatch:**

25
26 Cpl. Anderson was at HCSO MSP when Cpl. Brown requested an additional unit. While driving to Loleta Cpl.
27 Anderson briefly read the call for service details, which was regarding a subject at the Bear River reservation that
28 had an injury, was requesting medical assistance, and the reporting party thought it to be "strange." Cpl. Brown
29 responded to the incident. Cpl. Anderson explained it sounded like the subject was becoming uncooperative,
30 had given Cpl. Brown a fake name, stated he had two broken wrists and had been in a vehicle collision.
31 Once nearing the incident location, Cpl. Anderson checked the area for a vehicle collision on Cpl. Brown's
32 request. Cpl. Anderson did not locate a collision or any signs of a collision. Cpl. Anderson then responded to Cpl.
33 Brown's location.

34 Upon arrival, Cpl. Anderson observed that the subject was gathering his belongings and being tended to by
35 medical personnel for a wrist injury. Cpl. Anderson was told by Cpl. Brown that the subject had refused to be
36 transported to the hospital. Cpl. Anderson reviewed a photo taken by Cpl. Brown showing the injury which was a
37 significant open laceration.

38 Cpl. Anderson was told by Cpl. Brown that the subject was acting strange and that he requested an ambulance
39 but then refused to go with the ambulance. Cpl. Anderson was also told that Cpl Brown believed the subject was
40 associated with a vehicle but was not sure which one it was. Cpl. Anderson also stated tribal personnel advised
41 him that the subject was no longer wanted on the property.

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Additional follow-up and secondary contact of the subject:

The Corporals identified a damaged vehicle possibly linked to the subject. Simultaneously the subject stood up and began walking to the casino, looking as if he was going to exit the property. After the subject was already walking away a tribal maintenance worker relayed information from security, advising the Corporals that surveillance footage showed the subject exiting the damaged vehicle. The vehicle was registered out of [REDACTED], under a name that did not match the one the subject initially provided.

The subject stopped at the Tobacco Traders and the Corporals contacted the subject. During this second contact the subject made conditional statements about leaving only if certain trucks—he claimed were law enforcement—left the area. [REDACTED] was told Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown were the only law enforcement on scene. Cpl. Anderson described the subject as giving short, vague answers, seeming “preoccupied,” “distracted,” and “strangely focused.” This was Cpl. Anderson’ first interaction with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was asked multiple times by the Corporals how they could help. [REDACTED] response was just to stare at the Corporals.

[REDACTED] went to vehicle, got in and drove away, stopping on the shoulder of Singley Hill Rd., just outside the entrance of the complex.

Behavioral Concerns and Surveillance Efforts:

Cpl. Anderson explained that initially they were going to follow [REDACTED] to make sure he left the area, but [REDACTED] stopped on Singley Hill Rd. for an unknown reason. Cpl. Anderson explained they parked away from [REDACTED], but in a position that they could still see him since they did not know why Nicholas had parked on the road.

As [REDACTED] sat in his vehicle, the Corporals monitored from a distance to see if he would leave. During this time, Cpl. Brown contacted [REDACTED] agencies (PD and SO) to determine any prior contacts with [REDACTED]. Though [REDACTED] had some prior law enforcement contact, public intoxication and battery, there were no records of the behavior they had seen.

At one point in the interview, Cpl. Anderson verbalized the possibility that [REDACTED] might be under the influence of [REDACTED] due to his unusual behavior, though Cpl. Anderson acknowledged there were no obvious signs of impairment.

During the interview I talked to Cpl. Anderson about [REDACTED] behavior after he learned his name was Bradford. I told him [REDACTED] father’s name was [REDACTED]. Cpl. Anderson confirmed that was a strange coincidence but did not know if that influenced [REDACTED] behavior. Cpl. Anderson thought it was more of a quip than a reason for [REDACTED] to charge him with a knife.

Lethal Encounter:

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1 While Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown were speaking about [REDACTED] behavior, [REDACTED] started his vehicle, made
2 a U-turn and drove toward the Corporal's location. [REDACTED] drives past Cpl. Anderson, who was parked door-to-
3 door with Cpl. Brown, parked and exited his vehicle. Cpl Anderson exited his patrol car, walked to the edge of his
4 patrol vehicle's hood, asks [REDACTED] "what's going on," and observed [REDACTED] slowly emerging from his vehicle.
5 Then Cpl. Anderson heard [REDACTED] say something similar to, "I'm just fucking done," and brandished a folding
6 knife, raising it over his head while moving directly toward the Corporals.

7
8 Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown drew their firearms and issued multiple verbal commands to stop, drop the knife,
9 and to get on the ground. Cpl. Anderson attempted to create distance by backing up a grassy incline behind the
10 patrol cars.

11
12 As [REDACTED] accelerated into a sprint with the knife raised above his head, Cpl. Anderson discharged his service
13 weapon approximately three times, striking the subject in the upper torso. Cpl. Anderson ceased fire once the
14 subject fell to the ground.

15
16 The knife was secured, and the subject was handcuffed. Corporal Brown retrieved his medical kit and began life-
17 saving efforts. Cpl. Anderson noted that the subject's wound appeared to be a central chest gunshot. The
18 deputies monitored vital signs and initiated CPR when they ceased.

19
20 **Clarifications and Reflections regarding contact:**

- 21
- 22 • Cpl. Anderson's initial arrival, which includes his conversation with Cpl. Brown and Bear River employees
- 23 are not on BWC.
- 24 • Footage from Cpl. Anderson's BWC becomes available during the second encounter near the Tobacco
- 25 Traders.
- 26 • Cpl. Anderson was told by Cpl. Brown that [REDACTED] was acting strange but did not interact with [REDACTED]
- 27 when he initially arrived on scene.
- 28 • Paramedics had already left when Cpl. Anderson initially arrived on scene and had only seen a
- 29 photograph of the injury.
- 30 • Cpl. Anderson was told by a Bear River employee that [REDACTED] was trespassed from the property.
- 31 • Cpl. Anderson explained that there was a vehicle that was in the parking lot that Bear River employees
- 32 had seen [REDACTED] get out of on surveillance video. Previously a records check of the vehicle was
- 33 conducted by Cpl. Brown and Cpl. Anderson on the possibility that it belonged to [REDACTED]
- 34 • Cpl. Anderson never saw the surveillance footage of [REDACTED] getting out of the vehicle at the Tish Non
- 35 Center. Cpl. Anderson was told that by a Bear River employee.
- 36 • The vehicle was parked in the Tish Non Community Center parking lot. This parking lot was located
- 37 directly across from where [REDACTED] was contacted at in front of the Recreation Center.
- 38 • Cpl. Anderson did not know why [REDACTED] was walking away instead of going towards his vehicle.
- 39 • Cpl. Anderson described that he and Cpl. Brown explained several times to [REDACTED] that he needed to
- 40 leave the property.
- 41 • Cpl. Anderson asked [REDACTED] how they could help him.
- 42 • Cpl. Anderson explained to [REDACTED] that taking him to jail didn't seem like the best option and the other

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- 1 option was going to the hospital, but that [REDACTED] didn't want to go there either.
- 2 • During the review of Cpl. Anderson's BWC footage, he and Cpl. Brown spoke about [REDACTED] being on
- 3 [REDACTED] In this interview Cpl. Anderson explained that was what he thought might explain
- 4 [REDACTED] behavior which was similar to what Cpl. Anderson had experienced before. Cpl. Anderson did
- 5 not believe [REDACTED] seemed drunk, "high," or that he was having a "mental-break."
- 6 • Cpl. Anderson explains that [REDACTED] is giving short answers, acting suspicious, standoffish, and like in his
- 7 head he is thinking about other things while Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown are speaking with him
- 8 • Cpl. Anderson thought [REDACTED] was alright to drive.
- 9 • If [REDACTED] completely refused to leave, Cpl. Anderson would have arrested him for trespassing.
- 10 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed that even though [REDACTED]' injury would have been required to be medically
- 11 cleared it did not prevent [REDACTED] from being arrested.

12 Clarifications and Reflections regarding lethal force:

- 13
- 14 • Cpl. Anderson did not know why [REDACTED] focused on him during the incident.
- 15 • Cpl. Anderson did not know where the knife came from, but once [REDACTED] got out of the car he unfolded
- 16 a knife. Later in the interview, Cpl. Anderson remembered that at some point with his interaction with
- 17 Cpl. Brown, Cpl. Brown told him [REDACTED] had a knife in his bag. Cpl. Anderson thought he learned that
- 18 when they were near the charging center.
- 19 • Cpl. Anderson could see the blade of the knife.
- 20 • Cpl. Anderson gave commands similar to "put that down" when [REDACTED] unfolded the knife.
- 21 • When [REDACTED] charged Cpl. Anderson, Cpl. Anderson thought he was going to try and stab him, which
- 22 would likely kill him or create some great bodily injury.
- 23 • Cpl. Anderson did not think he had any other options besides shooting because it happened so fast.
- 24 • Cpl. Anderson estimated [REDACTED] was between 20-25ft away when he began to run towards Cpl.
- 25 Anderson.
- 26 • Cpl. Anderson estimated [REDACTED] was less than 10 feet away from him when he shot.
- 27 • Cpl. Anderson stopped shooting when [REDACTED] fell because the threat had ended.
- 28 • Cpl. Anderson did not think he had a chance to use any other tool.
- 29 • Cpl. Anderson chose a lethal force option instead of a less-lethal option because he matched force-to-
- 30 force.
- 31 • Cpl. Anderson explained that if [REDACTED] would have stood in the door way of the vehicle Cpl. Anderson
- 32 could have used other options, like negotiating, switching to other tools or to get more people, but
- 33 [REDACTED] began to immediately walk towards Cpl. Anderson.
- 34 • Cpl. Anderson was scared during the incident and "definitely" thought [REDACTED] was going to stab him.
- 35 • Cpl. Anderson initially thought [REDACTED] might be suicidal when he said, "I'm just done."
- 36 • Cpl. Anderson explained [REDACTED] became assaultive when he raised the knife over his head and charged
- 37 him. "Like he switched from suicidal to like homicidal. It felt like this big switch in the moment."
- 38 • Cpl. Anderson was aiming "center mass" when he decided to shoot.
- 39 • Cpl. Anderson did not notice his background at the time of shooting, but that is why he backed up the hill
- 40 so the street and not the family fun center was his backdrop.
- 41 • The firearm Cpl. Anderson used is the same one he uses at training and recently qualified with it.

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- 1 • Cpl. Anderson normal load-out for the handgun is 16 round in the magazine and 1 round in the chamber
- 2 and 16 rounds in his spare magazines.
- 3 • No one had access to Cpl. Anderson's firearm before the incident.
- 4 • Until the actual violent incident, there was nothing up to the point with Cpl. Anderson's encounters with
- 5 [REDACTED] that indicated [REDACTED] was going to respond to him or Cpl. Brown in a violent manner.
- 6 • Cpl. Anderson did not think a call to a supervisor was necessary based upon how the call was being
- 7 handled prior to the shooting.

8 Several Follow up questions were asked by Attorney [REDACTED] and answered by Cpl. Anderson. Some of
9 those questions are detailed below.

- 10
- 11 • Cpl. Anderson was not fearful beyond the normal operating level of safety until the knife came out.
- 12 • There was nothing articulable beyond general suspicion that [REDACTED] was going to do any "crazy."
- 13 • Cpl. Anderson would have not gotten so close to [REDACTED] during the early interactions if he had a
- 14 concern [REDACTED] was going to stab him or use a weapon against him.
- 15 • 24 seconds lapse from the time [REDACTED] pulled the knife until Cpl. Anderson fired his first shot.
- 16 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed with [REDACTED] that was not a lot of time to make plans, switch equipment, or get
- 17 other people on scene.
- 18 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed with [REDACTED] that if he drew his taser and if it were ineffective he would not
- 19 have enough time to draw his firearm and shoot [REDACTED]
- 20 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed he is not trained to present a less lethal option against a lethal option.
- 21 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed he is trained to create space, which is what he did.
- 22 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed [REDACTED] was holding the knife over his head and believed [REDACTED] intent was
- 23 to stab him.
- 24 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed with [REDACTED] that is was possible there were things that happened on scene
- 25 that he saw, heard, thought, did that he had no recollection of.
- 26 • Cpl Anderson confirmed with [REDACTED] that it is possible things were happening and going on around him
- 27 that he never perceived.
- 28 • Cpl. Anderson confirmed with [REDACTED] that [REDACTED] was in physical control of the knife, he was
- 29 physically able to use the knife if he chose to cause death or serious bodily injury.
- 30 • Cpl Anderson confirmed with [REDACTED] that he was backing up, giving commands, point his firearm at
- 31 [REDACTED], while [REDACTED] was running towards Cpl. Anderson with a knife over his head and that Cpl.
- 32 Anderson could think of no other reason a human being would do that other than to cause death or
- 33 serious bodily injury to the person on the other side of the knife. Based upon all that Cpl. Anderson
- 34 thought [REDACTED] presented the intent, means, opportunity and ability to cause death or serious bodily
- 35 injury, and pose an immediate threat to him and Cpl. Brown. That is why Cpl. Anderson fired.

36 **Environmental Context:**

- 37
- 38 • The incident occurred in daylight (approximately 1531hrs.)
- 39 • Deputies wore clearly marked uniforms with "Sheriff" labels."
- 40 • Patrol vehicles were marked and visible on scene.

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Legal and Tactical Justification:

Cpl. Anderson thought [REDACTED] was going to try and stab him, which would likely kill him or create great bodily injury. Cpl. Anderson did not think he had any other options besides shooting [REDACTED], matching like force to like force. Cpl. Anderson was consistent in describing his force was in response to [REDACTED] running at him with a knife.

Conclusion:

Cpl. Anderson thought [REDACTED] presented the intent, means, opportunity and ability to cause death or serious bodily injury, and pose an immediate threat to him and Cpl. Brown. That is why Cpl. Anderson fired.

[REDACTED]

On 06/11/2025, DAI Greg Hill and I spoke with [REDACTED] on the telephone regarding this incident. [REDACTED], who is employed as a security guard at Bear River Casino, recounted an incident that occurred while he was a patient in the ER at Redwood Memorial Hospital. [REDACTED] was next to a male patient (identity later confirmed via an online photo) who had reportedly cut his own arm. [REDACTED] overheard the man arguing with medical staff, refusing treatment, including antibiotics and providing blood/urine samples. Despite being calm, the patient insisted on leaving and said he was being held against his will. Medical staff informed him he was on a [REDACTED] for his safety. The subject indicated he would take a pill, because he could look-up online what it was, but then refused to take the pill as well.

Later, [REDACTED] was transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital in Eureka. [REDACTED] overheard medical staff indicating someone had fled the hospital. Though he didn't see the person, he suspected it was the same man from Fortuna. [REDACTED] did confirm that he saw the subject taken away from Redwood Memorial Hospital in an ambulance. [REDACTED] confirmed this was the morning of 06/05/2025. [REDACTED] suspicions were confirmed after seeing a photo of the individual online following the Bear River incident.

[REDACTED] stated he was not under the influence of any medications while he was at Redwood Memorial Hospital during the event.

[REDACTED]

On 07/16/2025, at approximately 0930hrs., I and DAI Bise conducted a phone interview with [REDACTED] in reference to a male subject who approached her residence requesting assistance and was later believed to be involved in a shooting.

[REDACTED] stated that on 06/05/2025, a male subject arrived at her front door asking for a ride to Redwood Memorial Hospital if he gave her \$100. [REDACTED] inquired if he meant the nearby hospital, but he clarified he needed to go to a different facility farther south. Due to the presence of her grandchild at the residence, [REDACTED] declined to drive the subject herself but indicated she would have considered doing so if she had been alone.

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1 She emphasized that the subject did not appear threatening.

2
3 The subject identified himself only as [REDACTED] [REDACTED] described him as a white male wearing a red T-shirt
4 and sweatpants (possibly inside out), with a bandaged arm actively bleeding. He had no bags or other
5 belongings, and his clothing was stained with blood. She noted his beard was well-groomed, and that he was
6 polite and calm during the interaction.

7
8 [REDACTED] called her son and attempted to find someone who could transport the subject to Fortuna. At that time,
9 [REDACTED], a former neighbor, happened to drive by. [REDACTED] flagged him down and explained the situation.
10 Although [REDACTED] expressed hesitation upon learning she did not know the subject, [REDACTED] agreed to give the
11 male a ride since he had already verbally committed.

12
13 [REDACTED] estimated this occurred around 1200hrs., on 06/05/2025. After they departed, she spoke with her 15-
14 year-old grandson, [REDACTED] expressing concern that she may have put someone else in an uncomfortable or
15 potentially dangerous position. [REDACTED] looked up the estimated travel time from her residence to Redwood
16 Memorial Hospital, which was approximately 26 minutes, and called [REDACTED] around 12:26 or 12:30 PM to
17 check on his status. [REDACTED] confirmed he had dropped the subject off safely, though he described the ride as "a
18 little weird."

19
20 Later that evening, [REDACTED] contacted [REDACTED] again, indicating that based on local news and descriptions, the man
21 he gave a ride to may have been involved in a shooting incident.

22
23 [REDACTED] stated she traveled to Medford shortly after and experienced issues with her phone for approximately
24 two days. Upon returning and seeing a public advisory requesting information, she contacted the Sheriff's Office
25 to report her contact with the subject.

26
27 [REDACTED] stated the subject did not elaborate about how his vehicle ended up in Fortuna except for saying it was a
28 long, complicated story and by that time [REDACTED] had shown up. She did not question him about it, though the
29 wound was visibly bleeding through his bandage. She also noted the subject attempted to retrieve money from
30 his pants but appeared to struggle with the pockets due to how the sweatpants were worn. [REDACTED] also
31 described the subject wearing a red sweatshirt. The subject did not have any other property with him.

31 This search warrant was for surveillance footage all buildings located at the Tish-Non Community Center and
32 Casino. This warrant was returned "unserved." I completed the attached Bear River Tribal Gaming CCTV footage
33 request form and the request was granted after the search warrant was authorized. See below for further
34 information regarding my review of the surveillance footage. A copy of SW2500392 is attached to this report.

38 This search warrant was for surveillance footage from Redwood Memorial Hospital and St. Joseph's Hospital,
39 both owned by Providence. The warrant was server without incident and Providence provided footage for both
40 locations on multiple thumb drives. See below for further information regarding my review of the surveillance
41 footage. These thumb drives were booked into evidence as item #55, code 1949-4.

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SUREVEILLANCE FOOTAGE:

Bear River Tribal Gaming:

Bear River provided several surveillance files on a USB drive that appear to include all [REDACTED] time at the Bear River campus, beginning with him trying to rent a room at the hotel, his activity in his vehicle while in the basement parking lot and his contact with security in the basement parking lot. There is no audio included in those videos.

There is also a video of [REDACTED] inside the Tish-Non-Community Center speaking to staff, which is difficult to hear but I believe it's in reference to taking a shower.

The entire first responder contact with [REDACTED] near the Recreation Center, [REDACTED] walking towards the direction of the casino, and Cpl. Brown and Cpl. Anderson contacting him on the lawn near the vehicle charging area by the Tobacco Traders is also included in those surveillance footage files.

Also included is [REDACTED] driving out of the complex and parking on Singley Hill Rd, including a view of where Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown are parked.

There are two camera views of the lethal force incident. This includes [REDACTED] driving past the Corporal's location, exiting his vehicle and pulling out a folding knife from his pocket. The exposed blade of the knife is clearly visible in the surveillance footage. [REDACTED] begins to walk with his hands up and the blade positioned for a downward strike. Both Corporals have their weapons drawn and begin to back pedal away from [REDACTED]. Once [REDACTED] makes it around the patrol vehicle he begins to run towards Corporal Anderson, while Corporal Anderson is backing away from [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] closes the distance, and Cpl. Anderson shoots him. This all happens in approximately 27 seconds.

Once [REDACTED] falls to the ground, the Corporals made sure the knife was out of reach and began to render aid and radio for support services. The USB drive containing all the footage was booked into evidence as item #57, code 1949-6. Refer to USB drive for complete details.

Redwood Memorial Hospital:

During the review of this footage, [REDACTED] arrives at RMH's parking lot on 06/04/2024 at approximately 2112hrs., driving the Lexus. A [REDACTED] SUV, appearing to be a Dodge Durango, arrived just before [REDACTED] and the vehicles park next to each other. The driver of the vehicle gets out and appears to be a white adult female and a passenger child gets out as well. [REDACTED] gets out of his vehicle and he and the female had a brief conversation, ending with the female driving away with the child. Based upon the quality of the surveillance footage, along with searching through Flock data, the vehicle could not be identified. At the completion of this report, the female or the white SUV could not be identified.

This footage also contains Fortuna PD responding which corresponds to attached reports from Fortuna PD where they were called by RMH medical staff to speak with [REDACTED].

The USB drive containing all the footage was booked into evidence as item #55, code 1949-4

St. Joseph Hospital:

During the review if this footage, I was able to see [REDACTED] arrive via ambulance and be placed in an ER room. While in the emergency room, a "bed sitter" is outside his room reading. After being there for some time, [REDACTED] runs out of his room and leaves the emergency room though a southern exit. [REDACTED] flees the hospital parking lot while being pursued by security while wearing a hospital gown. The USB drive containing all the footage was also booked into evidence as item #55, code 1949-4.

HCSO ISSUED SAMSUNG CELLPHONE REVIEW:

FS [REDACTED] completed a Cellebrite extraction on both Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown's department issued cellphones. These cellphones also double as their issued BWC's. I reviewed the report for each cellphone for 06/05/2025 and did not locate anything of note related to this incident.

[REDACTED] vehicle was released to [REDACTED], and she was determined to be next of kin. The release of the vehicle is documented is supplemental #37.

1 On June 5th, 2025, I was working as a patrol deputy for the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office and assigned to
2 work in the Eureka-Main Station patrol area as unit "Q39". I was wearing the marked uniform of a HCSO Deputy
3 Sheriff and driving a marked patrol vehicle. I was also wearing my department issued body worn camera
4 throughout my shift and all appropriate BWC media was later tagged and stored via Visual Labs.

6 At approximately 1530 hours, while dealing with an individual in the HCSO Eureka-Main station lobby, I heard
7 HCSO Corporal Anderson state "shots fired" over the office's overhead speakers. I also knew that Cpl. Anderson
8 had been dispatched to assist HCSO Corporal Brown with a subject exhibiting unusual behavior near the Bear
9 River Recreation Center, located at 266 Keisner Road on the Bear River Rancheria in the community of Loleta.
10 Immediately after hearing the "shots fired" transmission, I moved to my patrol vehicle and responded to the
11 Bear River Rancheria "Code 3" – emergency lights and siren activated.

13 At approximately 1545 hours, I arrived on scene and approached HCSO Sergeant Losey, who was the on-scene
14 supervisor at the time. As I approached Sgt. Losey, I saw a male, later identified as [REDACTED], on a
15 medical gurney being loaded into the rear of an ambulance which was already on scene. The ambulance left the
16 scene immediately after the gurney had been secured inside. I also noted that Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown
17 appeared uninjured and were standing on the perimeter of the scene with companion deputies. I also knew from
18 radio transmissions heard en route to the scene that there were no outstanding [REDACTED]. Seeing the scene was
19 safe and there was no immediate assistance needed, I asked Sgt. Losey if I should follow the ambulance to the
20 hospital. Sgt. Losey confirmed I was to follow the ambulance.

22 At approximately 1559 hours, I arrived at Redwood Memorial Hospital, located at 3300 Renner Drive in the City
23 of Fortuna, approximately two minutes after the ambulance had arrived. I was informed by the ambulance crew

27 I entered the emergency room where I observed [REDACTED] being attended to by multiple medical professionals

1 On 6/05/2025, I responded to a CIRT call out to assist with investigating an OIS. In preparation for the
2 briefing, I accessed the Visual Labs website and queued up the Body Worn Camera (BWC) footage from Deputies
3 Anderson and Brown that depicted the incident. I was assigned to respond to Redwood Memorial Hospital in
4 Fortuna along with DAI Marsolan and EPD Detective Cosetti. When we arrived at the hospital, Deputy
5 Campadonia and Fortuna PD Sgt. Charlton were maintaining scene security of an emergency room. The
6 emergency room contained the deceased in this case.

7 I entered the emergency room and took overall photographs of the room. The deceased was covered
8 with a white blanket. I collected 2 black Vans socks and 2 black Adidas shoes which were on the floor. We then
9 awaited the arrival of Deputy Coroner Van Buskirk for further processing.

10 When Van Buskirk arrived the white blanket was removed and I took overall photographs of the body.
11 The deceased was lying on his back with his right arm underneath his body. The right wrist had a set of handcuffs
12 attached to it. A black sweatshirt, Grey underwear and brown pants had all been cut off by medical personnel
13 and were lying underneath the body. The left forearm was wrapped with a white gauze. Various items of medical
14 paraphernalia were located attached to the body. A projectile wound was located in the center chest. A second
15 projectile wound was located in the upper left shoulder. Both projectile wounds were circular and appeared to
16 be entrance wounds. I took close up photographs of the projectile wounds. I did not observe any wounds that
17 appeared to be exit wounds on the back.

18 After the deceased was collected into the body bag I collected the remaining clothing that had been
19 underneath him. The following lists all items collected at the hospital:

1 On 06/05/25 at about 1531 hours, I was working as an Investigator assigned to the MCD (Major Crimes Division)
2 of the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office. While at MCD, I was advised of an officer involved shooting involving a
3 Humboldt County Sheriff's Office deputy in the Loleta area of Humboldt County. It was determined that CIRT
4 (Critical Incident Response Team) would be activated and Lt. Holt requested I contact the CIRT agencies to
5 request their assistance.
6

7 I notified APD (Arcata Police Department) Detective Sgt. Altizer, EPD (Eureka Police Department) Detective Sgt.
8 Crnich, FOPD (Fortuna Police Department) dispatch and DOJ (Department of Justice) and advised them all of the
9 incident. It was requested we meet and brief at the MCD (Major Crimes Division) of the Humboldt County
10 Sheriff's Office at 1630 hours.

11
12 At 1630 hours, the CIRT briefing started. It was determined that Investigator Henderson and Humboldt County
13 District Attorney Office Investigator Bise would be the co-leads for the investigation. Investigator Henderson
14 assigned me to scene processing along with EPD Sgt. Crnich, EPD FA (Forensic Analyst) [REDACTED] and DOJ
15 analysts [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].
16

17 At 1710 hours, I arrived at the incident location, which was a short, dead end road north east of the intersection
18 of Brenard Road and Keisner Road in Loleta. A few minutes after arriving, I was contacted by Deputy Stoner who
19 advised he was with a subject that had a video of the incident on his phone. Deputy Stoner stated the subject
20 wanted to provide us with the video, but needed to keep his phone. I responded to Deputy Stoner's location,
21 which was the Bear River Community Center, and met with him and [REDACTED]. I briefly spoke
22 with [REDACTED] who advised he had recorded the incident on his phone. [REDACTED] then played the video for me,
23 which did appear to be a video of the shooting. I asked [REDACTED] if he could email the video. [REDACTED] stated yes
24 and sent the video to my work email. I checked my email to confirm I had received the video. [REDACTED] asked if he
25 could delete the video now because he did not want it on his phone any longer. I advised [REDACTED] that yes, he
26 could delete the video. A short time later, EPD Detective Bailey and Detective Aguilera arrived and interviewed
27 [REDACTED]. I later copied the video sent to me by [REDACTED] onto a CD, which was then booked into evidence.

29 I returned to the incident location where FA [REDACTED] and DOJ were scanning a taped off truck on Keisner Road in
30 front of the Tabacco Traders store. I learned this truck, a [REDACTED] Ford F-350 CA plate [REDACTED], had been struck with
31 a bullet on the bottom portion of the front passenger door. DOJ Analyst [REDACTED] advised that they were not
32 going to be able to extract the bullet from the passenger door on scene. It was then determined the truck would
33 be towed as evidence and process at a later time. Investigators Henderson and Bise met with the truck owner,
34 [REDACTED] and advised him that the truck was going to be towed for evidence purposes and it was
35 arranged for [REDACTED] to receive a rental car in the meantime. Detective Aguilera later transported [REDACTED] to
36 Enterprise in McKinleyville and assisted him with obtaining a rental car.

1 After the scanning was complete, we began searching a grassy area for expended shell casings. While at the CIRT
2 briefing, we watched body worn camera footage of the incident and learned that three shots had been fired by
3 the deputy. All three expended shell casings were located in the area where the deputy had been when the shots
4 were fired. DOJ collected the shell casings as evidence.

5
6 The Lexus sedan was towed as evidence by Clyde's Towing to the HCSO Myrtle Avenue Annex so it could later be
7 processed.

9 On 06/06/25, at about 1200 hours, I met with DOJ Analysts [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] along with Humboldt County
10 District Attorney Investigator Timothy Marsolan to process the Ford F-350. EPD Detective Ray Nunez had

SUPPLEMENT 6 - Deputy Processing

1 On June 5, 2025, I was working as a Investigator with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO), assigned to
2 the Major Crimes Division (MCD). At about 1531 hours, I heard shots fired broadcast over the radio. A Critical
3 Incident Response Team (CIRT) callout was initiated shortly after the deputy-involved shooting and a briefing was
4 to be held at 1630 hours, in MCD. I was assigned to the processing of involved deputies, along with [REDACTED]
5 (Arcata Police Department) and Greg Hill (District Attorney's Investigator). We were advised that both deputies
6 had been transported back to the HCSO and were awaiting processing.

7
8 The following is my documentation of the deputy processing procedure, which was conducted in tandem with
9 two representatives from outside agencies for transparency.

10
11 I used the CIRT Officer Processing Forms as a guide while completing this report. These forms were booked into
12 evidence. Prior to processing, overall photographs of both deputies were taken. Each confirmed that their
13 appearance at the time of processing accurately reflected how they looked during the incident.

14
15 **Corporal Kellen Brown – PIN: 2198**

16
17 Initial documentation of Cpl. Brown was expedited due to the presence of the decedent's blood on his hands.
18 Overall photographs were taken, along with close-ups of his hands, before he was permitted to wash up. This
19 initial documentation took place at 1625 hours and was later determined to be the decedents blood from
20 rendering medical aid immediately following the shooting.

21
22 Corporal Brown was wearing a standard patrol uniform consisting of a department-issued ball cap; silver-tan
23 short-sleeved shirt with department shoulder patches and corporal stripes; and an OD green Angel Armor patrol
24 carrier displaying his name, badge, and "Sheriff" identifiers. On his vest, he carried handcuffs, OC spray, a
25 tourniquet, two pistol magazines, a Motorola radio, and a flashlight. His work phone/body-worn camera (BWC)
26 was located in the right front vest pocket. He also wore a duty belt with a Safariland holster (right side), glove
27 pouch, baton/flashlight ring, and key ring. His pants were OD green 5.11 Strykes (with visible blood), and he
28 wore black Danner boots. A bloodied Benchmade folding knife was clipped inside the left front every day carry
29 (EDC) pocket on his pants. The 5.11 Stryke's have to front facing pockets designed for EDC items.

30
31 The pants and knife were seized as evidence due to the presence of blood. Cpl. Brown stated that the blood
32 transfer occurred while he was rendering medical aid to the decedent and that he used his knife to cut the
33 decedent's shirt.

34
35 Cpl. Brown was in possession of his department-issued sidearm: a Glock 17 Gen 5, Serial # [REDACTED]. The firearm
36 was equipped with a Trijicon optic and a Streamlight TLR-1 weapon light (Serial # [REDACTED]). A magazine was
37 seated in the firearm, and a round was chambered. The seated magazine contained 16 rounds of department-
38 issued Hornady 9mm Luger. Two additional fully loaded 17-round Glock magazines were positioned on the front
39 of his vest. Each magazine was downloaded, counted, photographed and ammunition confirmed as department
40 issued.

17 Corporal Anderson was also wearing a standard patrol uniform consisting of a silver-tan short-sleeved shirt with
18 department shoulder patches and corporal stripes. He wore an OD green Angel Armor patrol carrier displaying
19 his name and "Sheriff" identifiers; no badge was present. On his vest, he carried handcuffs, OC spray, two pistol
20 magazines, and a Motorola radio. His duty belt held a Safariland holster (right side) and a Taser X26P (Serial
21 # [REDACTED]) (left side), which was loaded with an unused 25-ft cartridge and contained a spare cartridge
22 stowed in the extended performance power magazine.

23
24 Cpl. Anderson wore OD green 5.11 Stryke pants (notable for a broken zipper and visible blood) and black Danner
25 boots.

26
27 His department-issued sidearm was a Glock 17 Gen 5, Serial # [REDACTED], equipped with a Streamlight TLR-1
28 weapon light (Serial [REDACTED]). A magazine was seated in the firearm with one round in the chamber. The
29 magazine contained 13 rounds of department-issued Hornady 9mm Luger. Two additional Glock magazines, each
30 loaded with 16 rounds, were stored on the front of his vest—intentionally downloaded from the full 17-round
31 capacity. Each magazine was downloaded, counted, photographed and ammunition confirmed as department
32 issued.

34 Cpl. Anderson's department ID was located in the right front magazine pouch of his pants. His left pant cargo
35 pocket contained a tourniquet, personal cellphone, a notebook, and unused nitrile gloves. In the right front
36 pants pocket, he carried his personal keys and wallet. His right cargo pocket contained a container of synthetic
37 nicotine pouches. His left rear pants pocket held a pair of used, bloodied nitrile gloves.

1 About 1730 hours I was called by District Attorney Investigator Tim Marsolan and informed he was at the
2 ER of Redwood Memorial Hospital as a part of a CIRT Team response to an officer involved shooting of a male
3 subject. The shooting had occurred on the Bear River Rancheria near the Recreation Center. The male subject
4 was brought to Redwood Memorial Hospital and subsequently declared dead at 1609 hours. I responded to the
5 ER.

6 On arrival I met with Detective Marsolan, Eureka Detective Amber Cosetti, and Sheriff's Evidence
7 Technician [REDACTED]. I was directed into ER room #6 where the deceased lay on the hospital gurney. He
8 was supine atop a backboard with his right arm crossing behind his back to the area of his left hip. I could see his
9 right-hand fingers and an unused loop of handcuffs protruded from under his back. A dressing of roller gauze
10 encircled the lower half of his left wrist. The left hand was not handcuffed. A round wound of the approximate
11 center of his sternum appeared to me to be an entrance-type gunshot wound with little to no external bleeding
12 observed. A round wound of the decedent's lateral left shoulder appeared to be an entrance-type gunshot
13 wound. Little blood had issued from that wound. The decedent had deformation of his left toes. The great toe
14 appeared near normal but subsequent toes were quite tiny. Two units of blood products lay between his legs,
15 one mostly empty and the other mostly full. The decedent had an endotracheal tub in place orally. Remote
16 defibrillator and EKG pads were in place. An intraosseus needle was in place in his left shin. [REDACTED]
17 [REDACTED]. Evidence Technician [REDACTED] said he had
18 photographed items in-place.

19 I was told the bandage on the decedent's left arm was placed by RMHER staff the previous night when
20 he had identified himself as [REDACTED]. The decedent was placed under a psychiatric
21 hold and transferred to St Joseph Hospital ER. Later the staff of RMHER had received a call from StJHER staff
22 informing them he had eloped from StJHER.

23 Investigator Marsolan told me [REDACTED] was thought to be a false name.

24 I prepared a new body pouch. Marsolan assisted in placing and secured a new paper evidence bag over
25 the decedent's left hand. The decedent's right forearm and hand was pulled free from under him. A new paper
26 evidence bag was secured over the right hand and handcuff. [REDACTED] was allowed to view and photograph the
27 decedent's back as the decedent was moved into the new body pouch.

28 No residual property remained on the backboard. I lifted the backboard away from the gurney. The
29 bedsheet on the gurney had a blood spot in the area where the decedent's left shoulder had been I estimated it
30 to be 8" in greatest dimension.

31 At 1831 hours on June 5, 2025 I sealed the body pouch with a serialized disposable padlock bearing
32 #06855. The investigators and [REDACTED] remained with the decedent while I completed the ER body release
33 paperwork.

34 I removed the decedent and secured him in the coroner vehicle. As I was leaving the ER I was told the
35 suspected true name of the decedent was thought to be [REDACTED]

36 I transported the decedent to the Coroner Station. There I labeled him with case #202502399 and his
37 weight of 198#. I then took x-ray images. Among those images I saw what appeared to be a shattered left
38 humeral head. A snowflake pattern of radio-opaque material led then to the area of the left arm pit where a
39 large radio-opaque item rested. I saw a second large radio-opaque item just left of his spine and closely superior
40 to his liver. Note that for an unknown reason the coroner's digital x-ray records the first x-ray taken as "2" and so
41 on. The total number of images taken was twenty two. Following taking x-rays I secured [REDACTED] body in
42 locked refrigerated storage. I saved .jpg images of each x-ray to the Coroner's "2025 Images" folder.

1 On June 6th Investigator Marsolan, Sheriff's Investigator Jennifer Taylor and Evidence Technician
2 [REDACTED] came to this office. The number on the disposable padlock was confirmed then removed. I then taped
3 it to the body pouch. Using a freshly cleaned touch pad, I took a full set of fingerprint images of this decedent. I
4 submitted the fingerprints to CJIS for identification of this decedent. I then placed another serialized disposable
5 padlock on the body pouch. The second padlock bearing #06803 was placed June 6th at 0904 hours witnessed
6 by Marsolan, Taylor and [REDACTED]. I then returned [REDACTED] body to locked refrigerated storage.

7 A short time later I received messages from both the FBI and California DOJ confirming the identity of
8 this decedent as [REDACTED]. I reported the positive identification to Coroner
9 Sergeant Head who forwarded that information to investigators.

10 About 1200 hours Sheriff's Investigator Destry Henderson assigned me to notify [REDACTED] family of
11 his death. Using databases available to me I identified [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Both
12 used the same address in [REDACTED] as [REDACTED]. After calling a few times I reached [REDACTED] and confirmed
13 their relationship. I then informed him of [REDACTED] death. [REDACTED] asked where Humboldt County was and
14 then replied that he did not know why [REDACTED] would have been in Humboldt County. [REDACTED] told me
15 [REDACTED] was unmarried and had no children. I relayed to Henderson that I had informed [REDACTED] family.

16 On Friday, June 6th I went to Redwood Memorial Hospital seeking any residual blood that remained in
17 the medical laboratory. I received three tubes of blood taken during the initial June 4th visit. I proceeded to St
18 Joseph Hospital seeking the same. The Laboratory staff of St Joseph Hospital informed me there had been an
19 order for a lab test but no blood was drawn because [REDACTED] had already eloped from their care. I returned
20 to this office; then labeled and stored the samples in refrigerated storage.

21 I have requested complete medical records from both Redwood Memorial and St Joseph Hospitals.
22 Those requests included requests for charting [REDACTED] treatment under the pseudonym [REDACTED].

10 drives that have been forensically sterilized.

SUPPLEMENT 10 - Supplemental for Incident Command Documentation

1 I, Justin Braud, have been a full time peace officer in the State of California since December of 2002. I am
2 currently employed by the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO), holding the rank of Undersheriff.

3
4 On June 5, 2025, I was on duty, in the Sheriff's office at the Eureka HCSO Main Station, wearing a distinctly
5 marked law enforcement uniform. I was in a meeting with the Sheriff and Lieutenant Taylor. At approximately
6 1531 hours, I heard a Deputy advise "shots fired" over the radio. I brought this to the attention of the Sheriff and
7 Lieutenant Taylor. All three of us immediately left the office to respond to the scene. I ran outside, entered my
8 distinctly marked law enforcement vehicle, and checked RIMS on my MDT to see where the incident was
9 occurring. I saw that the incident occurred at the intersection of Brenard Road and Keisner Road on Bear River
10 Housing (BRH), in the unincorporated area of Humboldt County known as Loleta. The following is, to the best of
11 my recollection, a summary of my involvement and actions from this point forward:

12
13 While en-route, I monitored all the radio traffic broadcast, and reviewed the call for service (CFS) to familiarize
14 myself with what was going on. In summary, Deputies Anderson and Brown had been dispatched to a subject
15 causing a disturbance at the Bear River Recreation Center (BRRC). It was not documented in the CFS what led to
16 the shooting.

17
18 Emergency Medical Services (EMS) were requested by Deputies on scene, and I heard it broadcast that CPR was
19 in progress.

20
21 The Sheriff arrived on scene before me, and declared himself the Incident Commander (IC).

22
23 At approximately 1557 hours, I arrived at the intersection of Brenard Road and Keisner Road, which is a "T"
24 intersection at the entrance to BRH. There were numerous law enforcement and EMS vehicles parked on both
25 sides of the road and people everywhere. I pulled my vehicle to a position to park without blocking
26 ingress/egress, and put myself out at the scene.

27
28 I exited my vehicle and approached the Sheriff to get briefed. After a quick brief on what transpired and what
29 needed to be done, I took over as the IC. I radioed dispatch updating my status, the name of the incident, the
30 radio channel to be used, the location of the Command Post (CP) and had the radio marker canceled.
31 Additionally, I verified that the Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) and HCSO Peer Support had been
32 activated.

34 At the CP I established an Incident Command Structure (ICS) for the incident to coordinate efforts.

36 I assigned Deputies and assisting agency personnel to establish traffic control points at all three sides of the "T"
37 intersection.

39 I assigned Deputies to identify both crime scenes by circling them with caution tape and guarding them.

1 On June 5, 2025, I was working as a detective with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO), assigned to the
2 Major Crimes Division (MCD). At about 1531 hours, I heard shots fired broadcast over the radio. A Critical
3 Incident Response Team (CIRT) callout was initiated shortly after the deputy-involved shooting, and a briefing
4 was to be held at 1630 hours in MCD.

5
6 I was assigned to the interview team, along with Keith Altizer (Arcata Police Department Sergeant) and Donald
7 Bailey (Eureka Police Department Detective). We were advised that multiple witnesses needed to be
8 interviewed. We learned that those witnesses were currently still located in the incident location, which is
9 located in Loleta, California. (Humboldt County)

10
11 At approximately 1719 hours, I arrived at the intersection of Keisner Road and Brenard Road. I was informed that
12 the remaining members of the interview team were located at the Bear River Band of the Rohnerville Rancheria,
13 266 Keisner, Loleta, CA. 95551, I responded to the building and met with Detective Bailey, who was in the
14 process of interviewing witness, [REDACTED]. Refer to Detective Bailey's supplemental narrative for
15 more details regarding the interview.

16
17 After the interview was concluded, Detective Bailey and I responded to the office of [REDACTED] where
18 Sgt. Altizer was interviewing witness [REDACTED]. Refer to Sgt. Altizer's narrative for more details of the
19 interview.

21 During the interview, I learned that there was a possible witness who interacted with the decedent in the sauna
22 of the Bear River Recreational Center. I learned that members who utilized the recreational services had to check

24 [REDACTED] informed me that he would have to verify with the Bear River Rancheria if he could release information

32 Enterprise in McKinleyville and assist him in obtaining a rental car, as his vehicle had been towed as evidence.
33 [REDACTED] is the owner of the truck that was suspected of being struck by a projectile at the time the incident
34 occurred. The vehicle was going to be seized as evidence; thus, arrangements were made to have a temporary

1 On 6/11/2025, I was working as an Investigator with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO), assigned to
2 the Major Crimes Division (MCD). I was tasked with attending [REDACTED] autopsy, which was to be conducted at
3 Eversole Mortuary in Ukiah, California. Due to CIRT policy, I was paired with District Attorney Investigator (DAI)
4 Richard Bise and Evidence Technician [REDACTED] with the Arcata Police Department (APD). Deputy Coroner
5 Michael Hnilo loaded and transported [REDACTED] body.
6

7 We arrived at Adventist Health Ukiah Valley at about 0743 hours for an initial CT scan (computed tomography).
8 We then arrived at Eversole Mortuary around 0820 hours and unloaded [REDACTED] body. The mortuary acts as
9 the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office secure facility. The body was weighed and placed on the table, still sealed
10 in a blue body bag, awaiting the arrival of Dr. [REDACTED] and his staff.
11

12 The body bag lock was cut, and the autopsy started at 1012 hours. Present for the autopsy were [REDACTED],
13 Michael Hnilo, Richard Bise, and myself. The autopsy was conducted by [REDACTED] and his assistants,
14 [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Overall photos were taken with an initial inspection of the body prior
15 to cleaning and the internal inspection. The following were observations made by Dr. [REDACTED] and relayed to me:
16

17 The decedent sustained a gunshot wound to the left upper arm. The bullet entered through the outside of the
18 left shoulder (deltoid area), fractured the humerus (upper arm bone), and traveled downward and slightly
19 inward. The bullet came to rest just under the skin near the victim's left upper chest, close to the armpit. There
20 was no exit wound. X-rays confirmed the broken bone and the location of the bullet. Refer to autopsy photos
21 HC25-001 A (106-112, 121, 122, 140-144, and 186-207). This injury and bullet/fragment recovery were listed as
22 E2 and B2.
23

24 The decedent sustained a gunshot wound to the center of the chest, just above the sternum. The bullet traveled
25 through the chest cavity, striking the heart and right lung, before coming to rest just beneath the skin of the right
26 upper back. There was no exit wound. The entry and bullet collected were marked as E1 and B1. Refer to autopsy
27 photos HC25-001 A (113-120, 233-297, 304-310).
28

29 [REDACTED] stated the injuries were consistent with the briefing of the incident he was provided and mentioned
30 the first injury to the chest was the cause of death. He also mentioned that with the location, the bullet would
31 have likely caused spinal cord shock, causing the decedent to fall to the ground and turn his body, which explains
32 the second bullet injury to the left deltoid and its angle.
33

34 [REDACTED] stated the decedent's cause of death was a gunshot wound to the chest.

1 On 06/05/25, I (Kyle Holt) was on duty working as a Lieutenant assigned to manage the MCD (Major Crimes
2 Division) of the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office. At about 1531 hours, I was advised of an officer involved
3 shooting involving a Humboldt County Sheriff's Office deputy in the Loleta area of Humboldt County. I
4 consequently activated the Humboldt County CIRT (Critical Incident Response Team). I then contacted HCSO
5 Investigator Taylor via phone who was at the MCD office located at the HCSO Main Station in Eureka. I instructed
6 Investigator Taylor to make appropriate notifications to the Department of Justice and all Humboldt County CIRT

13 Corporal Anderson stated that he had fired his service weapon and that there were no outstanding [REDACTED]. I
14 directed Deputy Melendy to stand-by with Corporal Anderson to provide him support while on scene.

16 I then proceeded to direct units arriving on scene with tasks that needed to be accomplished, including scene
17 security, crime scene tape, crime scene log, and traffic control. I then stood by with Undersheriff Braud, who had

1 On 6/18/2025, I was working as an Investigator for the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) assigned to the
2 Major Crimes Division (MCD). At approximately 1300 hours, DAI Marsolan and I spoke with three members of
3 the Fortuna Fire Department present on scene for this incident. While we spoke to all members together, DAI
4 Marsolan led two interviews and documented them by report. Refer to his reports for further information.

5
6 I spoke with Fortuna Fire Chief [REDACTED] Chief [REDACTED] has been with the Fortuna Fire Department (FFD)
7 for 41 years and has worked in a paid position for the last 8 years.

8
9 Chief [REDACTED] stated that Loleta Fire doesn't always have adequate staffing during the day, so FFD will cover or
10 assist with their calls. This also applies when Loleta receives more extreme code calls or major injury calls.

11
12 Chief [REDACTED] stated that in this circumstance, he and [REDACTED], another firefighter, arrived on scene in response to the
13 original medical aid call. He stated he saw a female CHP officer and "Kellen" on scene and mentioned that "Brad"
14 wasn't there yet. While Chief [REDACTED] refers to Cpl. Brown and Cpl. Anderson by their first names, I will document
15 this report using their official titles.

16
17 Chief [REDACTED] stated when they arrived on scene, the Loleta Fire Department (LFD) was already there, despite not
18 having radioed that they were responding. He stated LFD was bandaging up the subject's arm. Chief [REDACTED]
19 stated he didn't interact with the individual but observed that he didn't appear to be fully present. He described
20 the subject, later identified as [REDACTED] as looking through people and not really responding to Cpl.
21 [REDACTED] questions. Chief [REDACTED] stated he didn't make any determination as to whether the subject was under
22 the influence or experiencing a mental health crisis due to the short amount of time he was on scene.

23
24 Chief [REDACTED] stated that shortly after they arrived, FFD received a medical aid call to Hydesville, so he and [REDACTED]
25 responded Code 3 (lights and siren) to that call.

26
27 Chief [REDACTED] stated that after handling the call in Hydesville, he and [REDACTED] returned to the station and were there
28 briefly before Chief [REDACTED] heard Cpl. Brown announce "shots fired" over the scanner. Chief [REDACTED] then
29 described the wave of emotion that went over him and the thoughts that went through his head. He stated he
30 didn't know if Cpl. Brown (Chief [REDACTED] son) had shot or been shot and acknowledged that, regardless,
31 someone's life was going to change forever. Chief [REDACTED] recalled hearing who he believed was Cpl. Brown call
32 for medical assistance and announce CPR in progress. Chief [REDACTED] stated they began their response, knowing
33 they were going to be dispatched even though it hadn't happened yet.

34
35 Chief [REDACTED] stated that when he arrived on scene, the only other law enforcement officer present was Matt
36 Moore with Fortuna PD. He also mentioned Bear River had done a great job closing the roadway and controlling
37 ingress and egress to the crime scene. Chief [REDACTED] stated that when he pulled up, he saw Cpl. Brown "bagging"
38 and Officer Moore ("Matt") doing compressions. He stated that Cpl. Anderson was off to the side, standing near a
39 bush at that point.

40
41 Chief [REDACTED] stated that when he walked up, Cpl. Brown diverted them away from a knife lying in the grass, and
42 his team began taking over for Cpl. Brown and Officer Moore. They had enough time to insert an oropharyngeal

1 airway (OPA). He stated the ambulance arrived shortly after, and the subject was loaded and transported to the
2 hospital, taking all three of his firefighters with them. Chief [REDACTED] stated he asked Cpl. Brown if he was okay, and
3 that was the last he saw of him until the following day.

5 Cpl. Brown is Chief [REDACTED] son. He indicated that his daughter also works at the HCSO in Dispatch. Chief [REDACTED]
6 stated it was difficult to separate work from being a parent in that situation—to see Cpl. Brown hurting over
7 what had just occurred and knowing it wasn't appropriate to comfort him. Chief [REDACTED] stated that regardless of
8 what happened, a person lost their life, and everyone else who was there for the incident would be forever

11 After the ambulance left, Chief [REDACTED] went around and cleaned up their garbage as part of his normal practice
12 of not leaving anything behind.

14 When asked about anything good, bad, or indifferent, Chief [REDACTED] stated it was pretty controlled when they first
15 arrived on scene and felt he and his team were safe. He then stated that while his intention was not to stick up
16 for Cpl. Brown or Cpl. Anderson, from what he saw, the decedent had the best chance of survival with the quick
17 transition to life-saving efforts by Cpl. Brown, Cpl. Anderson, and Officer Moore.

19 He further stated that he has conducted rescue breaths or "bagged" close to 1,000 people, and there is a certain
20 look or set of reactions you get when people are going to survive—he was not getting those signs in this case.

9 Hospital then placed on a [REDACTED] and transferred to St Joseph Hospital. [REDACTED] left St Joseph
10 Hospital by 'running away'. After [REDACTED] was shot he was transported from the scene in Loleta to Redwood
11 Memorial Hospital. I placed that packet of medical records to also be delivered to [REDACTED]

12 I was then out of the office June 10th and returned on June 19th. During my absence Coroner Sergeant
13 Brandon Head requested the ambulance records for care provided to [REDACTED] after he was shot. When
14 received he placed the records in this case file. On June 12th Sgt. Head forwarded a copy to the Major Crimes
15 Division.

16 Deputy Coroner Michael Hnilo had transported [REDACTED] and the above items to Mendocino County.
17 Following the autopsy he returned [REDACTED] to the Coroner Station and secured his body in locked refrigerated
18 storage along with body fluid samples of [REDACTED]. See Deputy Hnilo's supplement for details on his actions.

19 When I returned to the office Deputy Hnilo had forwarded an email to me that he had received from [REDACTED]

1 On June 18, 2025, I was working as a detective with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO), assigned to the
2 Major Crimes Division (MCD). Investigator Henderson requested I meet with three Loleta Volunteer firefighters
3 () regarding their involvement in HCSO Case #: 202502399.
4

5 **History:**

6
7 On June 05, 2025, all three responded to the Bear River Recreation Center (266 Keisner Road, Loleta, California)
8 located in Humboldt County, for the report of a male with a bandaged, bloody arm that was actively bleeding.
9 There were multiple individuals from different agencies who responded, one of whom was Corporal Kellen
10 Brown with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office. Corporal Brown contacted (DE) ()
11 had a large open wound on his right forearm, and against medical advice, he declined to be transported to a
12 hospital for treatment.

13
14 () was advised by Bear River personnel that he was to leave the property. Corporal Brown informed
15 () that he needed to vacate the area. () left the area, but later returned while Corporal Brown, now
16 accompanied by Corporal Bradford Anderson, was standing just east of Bernard Road. () returned driving
17 a dark-colored vehicle. () exited his vehicle and approached the officers, yielding a knife, and pursued
18 deputies. An officer-involved shooting occurred. () responded and assisted in
19 providing medical aid.
20

21 Based on their involvement, Sgt. Ahltizer with the Arcata Police Department and I arranged to meet with the
22 three firefighters. At approximately 1348 hours, I met with three Loleta Volunteer firefighters (),
23 () at the Loleta Volunteer Fire Department (567 Park Street, Loleta, California).
24 First, we met with ()
25

26 The following summary is a condensed version of the interview. Due to the nature of the interview, some
27 questions were asked multiple times to verify that () answers were understood, and at different times
28 during the interview, depending on the flow of the conversation. The narrative is written for reader
29 comprehension and not necessarily in the order in which () provided information. For complete details,
30 please refer to the audio recording of the interview, which was admitted into evidence. The following is a
31 summary of () statement.

35 () is a Lieutenant with the Loleta Volunteer Fire Department. On June 05, 2025, () and his crew were
36 dispatched to the report of a male bleeding in the locker room at the rec center. (). Commuted to the call
37 from Ferndale, California, and trailed an ambulance.

38 After arriving, () approached (), who sat on a cement pillar under the awning. () observed a very
39 deep laceration on his arm () could not recall which arm had the laceration). () observed Corporal
40 Brown speaking with () and another individual he believed to be the rec center manager. Paramedics and
41 EMTs with City Ambulance were also present.

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1 [REDACTED] only wore a towel that covered the lower half of his body, and wore sandals. [REDACTED] noticed that
2 [REDACTED] did have a knife with him during the incident, positioned at his right side. [REDACTED] could not entirely
3 remember the knife's appearance but believed that it was four to five inches in length. [REDACTED] could not
4 remember whether the knife was a fixed blade or had a handle. [REDACTED] noted that the knife was somewhat
5 concealed and that he did not want to draw attention to it.

6
7 [REDACTED] spoke with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] claimed he sustained the injury from a car accident but was not willing to
8 provide more information. [REDACTED] turned over care to the Ambulance personnel, and he remained to assist.
9 Following this, more volunteers with the Loleta Fire arrived to help [REDACTED] was able to see the muscle hanging
10 out from [REDACTED] forearm and described it as not normal. [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] had his own gauze on
11 the injury.

12
13 Medical and Law enforcement made multiple attempts to obtain [REDACTED] information; however, he refused to
14 provide his name or date of birth. Corporal Brown told [REDACTED] numerous times that he was not in trouble, and
15 [REDACTED] echoed that message. Ultimately, [REDACTED] provided the name, [REDACTED]. Corporal Brown discovered
16 that the name provided by [REDACTED] was not his name.

17
18 [REDACTED] was calm and patient with medical personnel; he winced when they touched his arm, so [REDACTED]
19 assumed he felt pain from the injury. [REDACTED] described that the incident escalated, and that [REDACTED] became
20 frustrated at the repeated question. [REDACTED] did not want to get in the ambulance or go to the hospital. [REDACTED]
21 noticed that [REDACTED] demeanor would change depending on who he spoke with. [REDACTED] mood shifted
22 when speaking with Corporal Brown. [REDACTED] did not tolerate Corporal Brown's commands or questions.
23 Corporal Brown attempted to gather [REDACTED] identifying information or ask how he came to be in Humboldt
24 County. [REDACTED] was uncooperative and gave Corporal Brown different names.

25
26 Medical personnel advised [REDACTED] that his wound was infected and that his injury was severe; however,
27 [REDACTED] went against the medical personnel's advice and did not seek further treatment. Medical personnel
28 decided to address his wound as best as they could while on scene, and had [REDACTED] sign the form noting he
29 refused treatment. Medical and Fire Personnel then cleared the scene. [REDACTED] did not believe that [REDACTED]
30 should have refused to be transported to the hospital.

31
32 Despite knowing where he was and answering simple questions, [REDACTED] believed that [REDACTED] was "on
33 something." [REDACTED] based this assumption on his previous seven years of training and experience in talking with
34 individuals who are under the influence. [REDACTED] described [REDACTED] pupils to be dilated. Seeing this, [REDACTED]
35 believed that [REDACTED] sustained a head injury or was on some type of [REDACTED] did not observe any injury to
36 [REDACTED] head. [REDACTED] did not see [REDACTED] vehicle, but he believed that [REDACTED] had enough mental
37 fortitude to seek his own medical treatment later.

38
39 Later, [REDACTED] and his crew were dispatched back to the rec center for the report of a gunshot victim. Initially,
40 [REDACTED] and medical personnel were advised to stage; however, while responding, they were instructed not to
41 stage and enter the scene. Upon arriving, they observed that the incident was not at the rec center but was
42 located east of the entertainment center in the field just east of Bernard.

5 transported out of the area. [redacted] did see Corporal Brown at the scene; however, he did not see Corporal
6 Anderson. [redacted] and his crew assisted in securing the scene.

7
8 [redacted] noted that the Fortuna Fire Department was on scene. He was aware that the Chief of the Fortuna Fire
9 Department was the Father of Corporal Brown, so he assumed that Fortuna responded due to the nature of the
10 call for service and Corporal Brown's involvement.

11
12 This concludes my summary of [redacted] statement. [redacted] then provided me with a copy of what he was
13 dispatched to. After speaking to [redacted], we spoke to [redacted] at approximately 1414 hours. The following is a
14 summary of [redacted] statement:

15

17 [redacted]:

18
19 [redacted] has volunteered for the Loleta Fire Department for about one year and has training in Basic Life Support.
20 On June 05, 2025, at approximately 1430 hours, they were dispatched to a 30-something-year-old male [redacted]
21 [redacted] with a hemorrhage. [redacted] and [redacted] responded to the call for services using vehicle # [redacted].

22
23 [redacted] was seated outside the recreational center with a bandage on his arm; he was wearing a towel, and he
24 appeared as if he had just gotten out of the shower. [redacted] had a bag with some of his property with him,
25 but [redacted] did not observe any weapons or a knife. [redacted] has never seen [redacted] before and did not recognize
26 him as a patient he has assisted in the past.

27
28 [redacted] had an open wound on his arm. [redacted] arm appeared broken, his cut was "Extremely deep", and the
29 muscle was showing. [redacted] had two cuts at the top of his arm. [redacted] could hardly move his fingers and
30 appeared stoic; he did not show pain, even though there was a bandage stuck to his cut that was being removed.
31 [redacted] breathing was fine; he wasn't panting or shallow breathing, and he had pale skin. [redacted] was unsure if
32 he was pale due to the amount of blood he had lost.

33
34 Medical personnel and law enforcement were on scene and tended to [redacted]. Ambulance personnel used
35 saline to remove the bandages from [redacted] arm with [redacted] assistance. They were unable to take [redacted]
36 vitals, as he was not cooperative. [redacted] was not very forthcoming with them and provided them with little
37 information about his identity and injury. [redacted] provided a name, but Corporal Brown later discovered that he
38 had provided a false name to those on scene. [redacted] believed that [redacted] was aware of his name and refused
39 to give it, due to hesitating, and it appeared as if he was fabricating a false identity.

40
41 Corporal Brown tried his best to get the information from [redacted]. Corporal Brown didn't "baby" [redacted] but
42 told [redacted] that his name was needed so they could help him. Corporal Brown stood there and only engaged

1 with him a few times. Corporal Brown stepped aside and allowed medical personnel to perform their duties and
2 speak to [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] described Corporal Brown as the protective force for the first responders on the scene.
3 [REDACTED] was frustrated and annoyed with the medical personnel; he was frustrated that they repeatedly asked
4 for his name. He asked, Why is that important or necessary.

5
6 [REDACTED] believed this level of response was unnecessary and believed that the injury would heal itself. [REDACTED]
7 became very upset and annoyed with the situation, so everyone attempted to keep [REDACTED] calm and reiterated
8 their purpose of being there and wanting to help him. [REDACTED] stated that the injury would heal itself if he were
9 provided a bandage after being against medical advice.

10
11 [REDACTED] was told that everyone on the scene was there to help. [REDACTED] was encouraged by multiple people to
12 go to the emergency room, but [REDACTED] refused. [REDACTED] also refused to sign the document, stating that he
13 declined medical attention. Medical personnel had Corporal Brown sign the form as a witness that [REDACTED]
14 refused medical assistance. [REDACTED] was then released to his care.

15
16 While on scene, [REDACTED] learned that [REDACTED] drove himself to the recreation center; however, she or other first
17 responders were unable to locate or identify his vehicle. [REDACTED] stated that he came to the Rec Center to
18 shower. First responders asked how he obtained his injury, and [REDACTED] responded that it was from a car
19 accident. [REDACTED] described this as a significant injury and was unsure how the rest of [REDACTED] person wasn't
20 injured if he was in a car accident. Even though she is inexperienced, [REDACTED] has responded to a couple of traffic
21 collisions.

22
23 [REDACTED] described [REDACTED] as being untruthful, so she was unsure if Corporal Brown could confirm any of the
24 information [REDACTED] provided. [REDACTED] went on to note that she did not feel unsafe while being around [REDACTED]
25 [REDACTED] believed that [REDACTED] was of sound mind and in a position to decide to refuse medical treatment if he
26 chose. [REDACTED] was able to answer all the pertinent questions. [REDACTED] was unaware if [REDACTED] was under the
27 influence of any drugs, but she suspected that he was on a type of drug or medication. [REDACTED] based her belief
28 on [REDACTED] not reacting to the pain of removing the bandages from his arm.

29
30 [REDACTED] did not know what [REDACTED] plans were moving forward, but she was aware that Corporal Brown was
31 trying to get him to leave the property. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] left after [REDACTED] refused medical treatment and
32 returned to the station. [REDACTED] began completing the necessary paperwork and then received a call of shots
33 fired. at approximately 1530 hours.

34
35 [REDACTED], and an additional firefighter loaded up in vehicle [REDACTED] and were directed to stage but
36 were later cleared to enter. Upon arriving, [REDACTED] observed [REDACTED] on the gurney and was directed to assist
37 with CPR. [REDACTED] did not see any wounds but believed that they may have been doing CPR over a wound. [REDACTED]
38 then drew the area, indicating where she thought the vehicles were parked and where the activity took place.
39 The drawing was collected and attached to the case.

40
41 After [REDACTED] was transported, the three remained to assist wherever needed and helped with scene security.
42 [REDACTED] described the location where she responded to assist the second time as the exact location described by

3 [REDACTED] believed that Fortuna Fire was there because their Fire Chief was Corporal Brown's father. [REDACTED] did see
4 Corporal Brown during her time at the second call for service. Corporal Brown appeared "shaken up," and he was
5 then taken off the scene. This concludes my summary of [REDACTED] Statement. Refer to the audio recording for
6 more exact details of what she observed.

10 After speaking with [REDACTED], I talked to [REDACTED] at approximately 1454 hours. The following is a
11 summary of [REDACTED] statement to the best of my recollection:

12

13 [REDACTED] has been associated with the Loleta Fire Department for two months and mentioned that he had limited
14 experience. On June 05, 2025, between 1230 to 1000 hours, [REDACTED] responded to the Bear River Recreational
15 Center for a medical assist.

16

17 Once he arrived, [REDACTED] described that he focused on "that guy" ([REDACTED]). [REDACTED] noted that he
18 felt that he had "tunnel vision". [REDACTED] had no training in crisis management and elected to stand by while
19 medical personnel tended to [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stood by and observed. [REDACTED] was seated at the piling in front
20 of the rec center, and [REDACTED] stood about ten feet south of him. [REDACTED] remembered that [REDACTED] had long
21 hair and appeared young. He believed that [REDACTED] was shirtless. [REDACTED] was on edge; he did not feel safe, so
22 he focused on [REDACTED].

23

24 [REDACTED] was unable to articulate what he was dispatched to and stated that he is not accustomed to listening to
25 the radio.)

26

27 [REDACTED] saw medical personnel remove the bandages; he saw the gashes on [REDACTED] arm and the meat that
28 hung from his arm. He saw white stuff, fat, and muscle hanging from [REDACTED] arm. [REDACTED] believed that
29 [REDACTED] had a high tolerance to pain and described that [REDACTED] did not complain or react to the removal of the
30 bandages, despite them being attached to his body. [REDACTED] believed that [REDACTED] may have been under the
31 influence of a controlled substance due to the little reaction. Medical personnel encouraged [REDACTED] to go to the
32 hospital, but he refused.

33

34 [REDACTED] was calm and poised. [REDACTED] assumed that [REDACTED] was ready to pounce if needed. [REDACTED]
35 described the scene as intense. [REDACTED] spoke very little and did not answer all the questions, and he appeared
36 to be very defensive. Due to this, [REDACTED] was on high alert.

37

38 [REDACTED] did not want to speculate whether or not [REDACTED] was in the right state of mind in order to refuse
39 medical care but noted that it did not seem normal for a person to have that much pain tolerance.

40

41 [REDACTED] noted that [REDACTED] provided the wrong name and date of birth to Corporal Brown. [REDACTED] did not
42 know Corporal Brown, nor had he ever seen Corporal Brown before the incident. [REDACTED] refused to sign the

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1 form acknowledging that he had refused the right to treatment. Moments later, [REDACTED]
2 cleared and walked back towards their truck.

3
4 Later, [REDACTED] were at the station speaking about the call they were just on when they were
5 dispatched to the second call of shots fired. They waited for [REDACTED] and another firefighter [REDACTED] to arrive at the
6 firehouse before leaving. Initially, they were dispatched to the stage, but were notified to enter the scene while
7 en route. Upon arriving, [REDACTED] saw Fortuna Fire, and multiple law enforcement vehicles were already on
8 scene.

9
10 [REDACTED] felt overwhelmed, but observed [REDACTED] on the gurney, with his chest exposed, and CPR being started.
11 [REDACTED] recognized [REDACTED] as the same person he saw in front of the recreation center. [REDACTED] later realized
12 that [REDACTED] was "gone," but mentioned that he did not see any blood. [REDACTED] later assisted with setting up
13 the tape to secure the scene.

14
15 [REDACTED] drew what he believed was the location of the shooting. [REDACTED] did not know the name of the streets,
16 but his statement and drawing matched the description of the incident location that was provided by [REDACTED] and
17 [REDACTED]. This concludes my summary of [REDACTED] statement. For more information, refer to the recording:

1 On 6/16/2025, I was working as an Investigator for the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) assigned to the
2 Major Crimes Division (MCD). District Attorney Investigator (DAI) Tim Marsolan and I conducted a phone
3 interview with a subject identified as [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] contacted the Sheriff's Office after viewing a public
4 safety bulletin on the social media platform X.com referencing a recent officer-involved shooting. [REDACTED] stated he
5 had a personal history with the deceased individual, later identified as [REDACTED], and believed his
6 information could be relevant to the investigation.

7
8 I conducted a phone interview with [REDACTED]. District Attorney Investigator Tim Marsolan was also present on the
9 call. The interview was recorded.

10
11 [REDACTED] stated he stated he previously lived in an apartment complex in Westlake Village, CA, within Ventura
12 County jurisdiction. During his time at the complex, he became acquainted with [REDACTED], who he
13 stated resided in the same building. The two were not roommates.

14
15 [REDACTED] reported that his interactions with [REDACTED] became increasingly concerning during the 16-month period
16 they both lived at the complex. He stated that [REDACTED] made verbal threats toward him, stalked him around the
17 complex, and physically assaulted him during incidents at a local gym and pool. [REDACTED] described a specific
18 incident where [REDACTED] struck or kicked him in the groin during a martial arts sparring session. He reported
19 that [REDACTED] would frequently follow him around the property and exhibit intimidating behavior.

20
21 [REDACTED] stated he submitted multiple tips to the Ventura County Sheriff's Office through their online reporting
22 system regarding [REDACTED] behavior. He also submitted complaints to the FBI due to what he described as
23 cyberstalking and a coordinated harassment effort involving other neighbors. [REDACTED] indicated that his safety
24 concerns contributed to him eventually moving out of the complex.

25
26 [REDACTED] provided further background information on [REDACTED], stating that [REDACTED] had a history of [REDACTED]
27 and had previously been [REDACTED]. He also stated [REDACTED] claimed to have been involved with white
28 [REDACTED] while in [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] described [REDACTED] as physically aggressive, unpredictable, and [REDACTED]
29 [REDACTED]. He stated [REDACTED] worked in mental health residential treatment facilities but was not a licensed
30 clinician.

31
32 [REDACTED] also mentioned a third individual, known only as [REDACTED] who was reportedly associated with both
33 himself and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] had a known [REDACTED], including a [REDACTED]. According to
34 [REDACTED], [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] met in a [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] expressed concern about
35 [REDACTED], stating he had received unwanted phone calls from him following [REDACTED] death. [REDACTED]
36 full identity is currently unknown.

38 [REDACTED] reported that his last known contact with [REDACTED] occurred on or around July 13th, 2025. He stated that
39 [REDACTED] contacted him by phone and FaceTime. [REDACTED] characterized the conversation as manipulative, and
40 stated that [REDACTED] appeared to be unstable and possibly traveling north to the Humboldt area. [REDACTED] denied
41 ever inviting [REDACTED] to visit and believed [REDACTED] may have come to the area to confront him. He suggested
42 that [REDACTED] state of mind at the time could have been consistent with [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] also stated that [REDACTED] was self-conscious about a congenital foot deformity and may have displayed signs of stimulant use during their past interactions, though he never personally observed [REDACTED] using narcotics.

[REDACTED] denied ongoing contact with [REDACTED] prior to his death and denied having knowledge of his travel plans. He provided a phone number for [REDACTED] as [REDACTED] but did not know his last name.

I later called the phone number for [REDACTED] and left a voicemail. As of 7/30/2025, I have not heard back from him.

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1 On August 7, 2025 the Coroner Division received [REDACTED] toxicology report from testing

1 On 8/21/2025, I was on duty as the Detective Sergeant for the Major Crimes Division of the Humboldt County
2 Sheriff's Office. Inv. D. Henderson assigned me to interview three (3) members of Loleta Volunteer Fire
3 Department who were believed to have responded and/or rendered assistance during the events of 6/5/2025.
4 Inv. Henderson told me that the Loleta Volunteer Fire Department Chief provided him with the following names
5 of members present on scene:

11 I enlisted the assistance of Detective Ray Nunez - Eureka Police Department for these interviews. He was present
12 with me for the interviews. The interviews were conducted by phone and recorded using a digital recorder. The

15 **Background**

16 Loleta Volunteer Fire Department responded to Bear River Rancheria, Loleta for two (2) separate calls for service
17 on 6/5/2025 relating to [REDACTED]

18
19 One (1) call was for medical aid and was just prior to the shooting incident. EMS (City Ambulance), Loleta Fire,
20 and Fortuna Fire were dispatched to the area of the Recreation Center at Bear River Rancheria Casino (Keisner
21 Rd., Loleta). Medical aid was provided to a male subject presenting with a laceration to his left arm, identifying
22 himself as [REDACTED]. This name was later determined to be false. The subject's arm was bandaged by EMS
23 personnel. The subject refused to go to the hospital by ambulance. Corporal K. Brown was present on scene for
24 this call. I was unable to locate the incident number in RIMS for this call.

26 The other call was Incident# 25.06.05.0113 - Time of Call 1416 hours - "In the rec center: male showed up with a

29 [REDACTED] explained that the incident took place in front of the gymnasium at Bear River Rancheria. [REDACTED] said

31 [REDACTED] indicated that she was pregnant at the time of this call. Upon returning from the restroom, [REDACTED]
32 remained standing outside the fire truck observing and ready to provide any assistance or gear as needed.

1 On 9/2/2025, I was working as an Investigator for the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) assigned to the
2 Major Crimes Division (MCD). District Attorney Investigator Tim Marsolan and I conducted a recorded interview
3 with ██████████ (██████████). ██████████ confirmed his full legal name is ██████████
4 and verified his current contact information. He reported serving with Fortuna Fire Department for seven years,
5 beginning in 2018, and currently holds the rank of Captain with Company 5. At the time of the referenced
6 incident, he was serving as First Lieutenant. ██████████ additionally works with Cal Fire, where he has served for the
7 past three years as a firefighter.

8
9 Regarding the Officer involved shooting at Bear River, ██████████ stated he and other fire personnel were monitoring
10 radio traffic when they heard a call of "shots fired" by "Kellen." (Cpl Brown) He and his crew responded from the
11 station and encountered a road blockage en route but were able to continue to the scene. Upon arrival, ██████████
12 observed Cpl. Brown performing CPR on a male subject. ██████████ and his partners relieved Cpl. Brown, with
13 ██████████ preparing medical equipment, including oxygen and a bag-valve-mask (BVM), while his partner
14 performed chest compressions.

15
16 ██████████ reported he operated the BVM throughout the resuscitation efforts until the arrival of ambulance
17 personnel. He, along with two other colleagues rode in the ambulance while continuing CPR en route to the
18 hospital. ██████████ stated he did not recognize the patient and had not previously encountered him, though he
19 believed other personnel had medical contact with the patient earlier in the day.

20
21 When asked about his observations, ██████████ indicated that, in his professional opinion, the subject displayed
22 signs consistent with being deceased at the scene, though he clarified he was not qualified to make a formal
23 determination of death. He did not recall anything unusual or out of place during the response.

24
25 The interview concluded with ██████████ stating he had no further information to add.

26
27 I request this report be forward to the DA's Office in conjunction with Investigator Hendersons report.

1 **Notification & Response**

2
3 On 6/5/2025 at around 3:45 while assigned as a detective with the Eureka Police Department, I was advised of
4 an officer involved shooting with the jurisdiction of the Humboldt County Sheriff Department (HCSO). I was
5 further advised that a Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) call had been made to assist and to respond to the
6 HCSO Major Crimes Bureau for a further briefing at 4:30 PM.

7
8 Upon arrival other investigators and myself were briefed on the incident by HCSO Investigator D. Henderson at
9 4:35 PM. During the briefing I learned that one HCSO deputy had fired multiple rounds at a subject after the
10 subject had approached the deputies with a knife at the Bear River Rancheria. I learned that the subject was
11 pronounced deceased. I then watched body camera footage of the incident. During video I observed the
12 deputies give multiple commands to the subject to drop the knife after the subject exited his vehicle and
13 approached the deputies. I observed the deputies attempt to gain time and distance by backing away from the
14 subject and using their vehicles as barriers. The subject continued to advance on the deputies and at one time
15 lunges quickly at one of the deputies. The deputy that was lunged at then discharged his firearm. I observed
16 deputies remove what appeared to be a knife from the subject and start to render medical aid.

17
18 Following the video, I was assigned by Investigator Henderson to conduct witness interviews with three potential
19 witnesses. Detective Sergeant K. Altizer with Arcata Police Department (APD) and Detective J. Aguilera with
20 HCSO were also asked to assist.

21

26 Once I arrived at Bear River, myself and Detective Sergeant Altizer went to the tribal administration center to
27 assist Investigator J. Taylor HCSO with the collection of cell phone video from a potential witness. I contacted
28 Investigator J. Taylor and we met with [REDACTED] an employee with Bear River who captured the
29 incident on his cell phone. Investigator Taylor was given consent to view the footage and [REDACTED] emailed
30 the footage to her.

31
32 I then conducted an interview with [REDACTED] in a meeting room of the recreation center at 5:27 PM.
33 Investigator Taylor and Detective Aguilera were present at various times during the interview along with [REDACTED]
34 [REDACTED] Who is the Tribal Administrator. The interview was audio recorded which was submitted. The
35 following is a synopsis of the interview, for the full interview see recording:

36
37 [REDACTED] advised that around 2:00 PM his supervisor [REDACTED] asked him to assist him
38 with checking an individual that had just walked into the recreation center. The individual was bleeding which
39 caused concern to [REDACTED] When [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] arrived at the recreation center they found the
40 subject showering and bleeding everywhere. [REDACTED] described the subject as a white male about six foot
41 tall with a beard and brown scruffy hair. [REDACTED] asked the subject if he needed any assistance and the subject
42 advised that he did. [REDACTED] provided the subject with a towel which [REDACTED] observed had quickly

1 absorbed a lot of blood from the subject. The pair remained outside the shower until the subject exited with the
2 blood soaked towel. The subject went outside while medical assistance was called. [REDACTED]
3 then gathered the subjects clothing in to a garbage bag to give to him. While putting the clothing in the bag they
4 did not feel anything that could be described as a weapon. [REDACTED] did advise that as the subject left he
5 heard him state that "somebody had taken his knife." The subject then sat down outside and [REDACTED] remained
6 with him.

7
8 A short time later an ambulance, fire personnel, California Highway Patrol troopers, and two sheriff deputies
9 arrived. Medical began treating the subject, but left after about an hour because the subject refused further
10 medical aid. The pair remained at the center cleaning up and observing the subject as he paced back and forth.
11 The subject then got in to his vehicle that was parked in the parking lot and drove near the intersection of
12 Brenard and Singley Hill Road. The subject parked his vehicle interfering with traffic for a about fifteen minutes
13 with the deputies remained parked nearby.

14
15 [REDACTED] advised [REDACTED] to go get a vehicle. The pair drove toward the intersection and observed the
16 subject pull his vehicle to where the deputies had parked. [REDACTED] to park their vehicle and as
17 they did [REDACTED] observed the subject exit his vehicle with his arms raised. [REDACTED] then observed the
18 two deputies backing up on foot with their guns drawn and he decided to begin to record the incident. About ten
19 to fifteen seconds later [REDACTED] heard several "pops." [REDACTED] advised that the subject came out
20 "hostile" and the deputies began immediately making loops or circles backing from the subject. As the deputies
21 were backing up two other employees [REDACTED] pulled up in [REDACTED] truck. [REDACTED] truck was then struck by
22 gunfire from the deputy as he fired on the subject. [REDACTED] observed the deputies handcuff the subject
23 then provide medical aid. [REDACTED] did not hear any conversation between the deputies and the subject
24 only yelling from the deputies. [REDACTED] was unsure what was yelled, but advised that the video should have
25 recorded it.

26
27 [REDACTED] advised that the recreation center did have cameras that should capture the subject in the facility
28 and outside. [REDACTED] advised that some of the cameras have audio and may have captured some conversation,
29 but he was unsure which cameras have audio.

34
35 On 6/6/2025, I attended a follow-up CIRT meeting at the HCSO Major Crimes Bureau. I advised Investigator R.
36 Blice with the Humboldt County District Attorney's Office (HCDA) that I believed the decedent [REDACTED]
37 had fled from the St. Joseph Hospital (Eureka) Emergency Room in the early morning hours of 6/5/2025.

38
39 On 6/9/2025, I conducted a record check of dispatched calls and found that EPD officers were dispatched to St.
40 Joseph Hospital at 6:19 AM on 6/5/2025. Staff at the hospital reported that [REDACTED] who had
41 a mental health hold from another agency had fled the hospital and ran in to the surrounding greenbelt. Hospital
42 staff were concerned due to [REDACTED] large open wound on his wrist that had been scheduled for surgery.

4 On 6-5-25 at about 1545 hours, myself and fellow detectives within CIU were advised of an OIS which occurred in
5 HCSO Jurisdiction. We responded to HCSO for a briefing at 1630 hours. I was assigned to a team with DAI Tim
6 Marsolan and HCSO Forensic Specialist [REDACTED]. We were tasked with responding to Redwood Memorial
7 Hospital where the decedent [REDACTED] was located.
8
9

10 REDWOOD MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

11
12 Upon arrival to the hospital we contacted staff who escorted us through the emergency department to the room
13 where [REDACTED] was located. The door to the room was closed and Sgt. Charlton with Fortuna Police
14 Department and HCSO Deputy Campadonia were standing outside the room. We entered the room and saw
15 [REDACTED] laying on his back on the gurney, covered with white blanket. There was blood on the floor and on
16 equipment throughout the room. [REDACTED] shoes were on the floor.
17

18 A hospital staff member advised [REDACTED] treated [REDACTED] and called [REDACTED] deceased at 1609 hours.
19
20

21 • HCSO Deputy Campadonia and FPD Sgt. Charlton statements

22
23 DAI Marsolan and I spoke with Deputy Campadonia and Sgt. Charlton while FS [REDACTED] collected evidence
24 within the room. Deputy Campadonia advised he learned from hospital staff that [REDACTED] had arrived at RMH
25 the night prior or earlier in the morning with a self inflicted wound to his arm. [REDACTED] was placed on a [REDACTED]
26 [REDACTED] and transported to St. Joseph Hospital. [REDACTED] then left St. Joseph Hospital and somehow
27 returned to retrieve his vehicle which was left in the roadway of the parking lot at RMH. (Deputy Campadonia
28 advised he would write a supplemental narrative pertaining to his involvement with this incident).

30 Sgt. Charlton confirmed what Deputy Campadonia had advised and included additional information. Sgt.
31 Charlton provided DAI Marsolan with the case number taken by FPD for the [REDACTED] Sgt. Charlton
32 also advised while at RMH and St. Joseph Hospital, [REDACTED] provided the name of [REDACTED] with DOB
33 of [REDACTED]

37 • RN [REDACTED] statement

38
39 DAI Marsolan and I also spoke with RN [REDACTED] who told us the following in summary:

40
41 She arrived to work in the morning and received information about [REDACTED] from a nurse who had worked the
42 previous night. She was told [REDACTED] was sent to St. Joseph Hospital due to trauma on his arm from a self

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1 inflicted wound. Later in the day she was informed by Security Guard [REDACTED] that a vehicle was in the
 2 parking lot, blocking the roadway. The vehicle was later determined to belong to [REDACTED]. The vehicle was a
 3 [REDACTED] Lexus hatchback which [REDACTED] took photos of and sent to her. Sometime around 1400 hours the vehicle was
 4 removed from the parking lot however it was unknown who retrieved the vehicle. Additionally, when [REDACTED]
 5 was initially treated he provided the name of [REDACTED] DOB [REDACTED]

7 This statement was audio recorded and placed onto the EPD M Drive as evidence.

10 • Security Guard [REDACTED] statement

12 DAI Marsolan and I spoke with [REDACTED] via phone due to him no longer being at work. During our
 13 conversation [REDACTED] sent me several images he took of [REDACTED] vehicle which was parked in the roadway of
 14 the rear parking lot to the hospital.

16 See DAI Marsolan's report for documentation of [REDACTED] statement and additional events.

18 I placed the images onto the EPD M Drive as evidence.

22 **BODY OF [REDACTED]**

24 Upon the arrival of HCSO Deputy Coroner Van Buskirk, the blanket covering [REDACTED] was removed. [REDACTED]
 25 was positioned on his back. There were several medical devices attached to [REDACTED] body. There was a bullet
 26 hole to the middle of [REDACTED] chest just below the nipple line and another bullet hole to his left shoulder. FS

1 NOTIFICATION

3 On 6-5-25 at about 1545 hours, myself and fellow detectives within CIU were advised of an OIS which occurred in
4 HCSO jurisdiction. We responded to HCSO for a briefing at 1630 hours. I was assigned to a team in charge of
5 processing the scene of the shooting. Also on the team were the following investigators:

11 We were advised the location of the scene was in Loleta on the Bear River Reservation. More specifically, the
12 location was near the intersection of Brenard and Keisner Streets.

13
14 SCENE

15
16 I arrived at the scene at approximately 1715 hours. When I arrived, I observed numerous police vehicles in the
17 immediate area. I observed what appeared to be two scene's that were sectioned off by yellow police tape. The
18 first scene was a section off roadway and an open field located northeast of the intersection of Keisner and
19 Brenard Streets. The section of roadway was a small extension of Keisner Street that was approximately 80 feet
20 long. On this section of roadway I observed a small [REDACTED] Lexus sedan parked facing north along the east side of
21 the road. Immediately south of the Lexus were two black and white marked Humboldt County Sheriff's
22 Department patrol vehicles. The two patrol vehicles were parked next to one another, but facing opposite
23 directions. One vehicle was facing north while the second was parked facing south.

24
25 To the immediate east of this location was an open grass field. I observed a section of the field appeared to have
26 a variety of medical supplies and equipment scattered on the ground. It appeared to be the location where
27 medical aid was rendered immediately following the officer involved shooting.

28
29 A second crime scene was taped off, further south of the first scene. Within the second scene I observed a [REDACTED]
30 Ford F-350 truck parked in the roadway on Keisner Street. The truck was stopped facing south in the northbound
31 lane of Keisner Street. The front driver's side door was standing open. It was reported to me the vehicle had
32 been struck by a bullet that had been fired by a deputy during the shooting. I observed yellow police tape
33 surrounding the truck, limiting access to the vehicle.

34
35 After the arrival of Forensic Analyst [REDACTED] and Crimlnalist [REDACTED] I stood by while they conducted scans and
36 photographs of the scene. Once scans and photos had been taken, I entered the first crime scene with the team.
37 Upon conducting a scene walk through, we identified items of evidence to include 3 9mm shell casings and
38 folding pocket knife with the blade extended.

39
40 The shell casings and pocket knife were marked, photographed, and then collected by DOJ Crimlnalist [REDACTED]
41 After the two patrol vehicles were scanned and photographed, they were released from the scene. The [REDACTED]
42 Lexus sedan was secured using evidence tape by HCSO Investigator Taylor. It was then towed from the scene as

3 At the second scene location, DOJ Criminalist [REDACTED] inspected the truck and noted there appeared to be bullet
4 impact then had entered the truck. After an initial inspection, he determined he was unable to remove the
5 bullet from the truck at that time. As a result, the truck was also secured with evidence tape and towed from the
6 scene on an evidence hold.

7

8 I remained at the scene while all evidence was collected and photos/scans were taken. I remained until both
9 scenes were secured and the evidence tape was removed. I then departed the area at approximately 2030
10 hours.

11

12 PRIOR CALLS FOR SERVICE

13

14 On 06/10/2025, I learned from HCSO Investigator Henderson that the man who had been shot by Deputies was
15 positively identified as [REDACTED] Investigator Handerson learned that prior to the officer involved
16 shooting, [REDACTED] had been placed on a [REDACTED] but had fled from care. During the [REDACTED]
17 [REDACTED] had been using the alias [REDACTED] It was believed that [REDACTED] had been placed on a hold
18 and admitted to Redwood Memorial Hospital in Fortuna. Due to injuries he had on his arms however, he was
19 transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Eureka for a higher level of care. While at St. Joseph Hospital, he fled prior to
20 being discharged for his injured arms and before he was evaluated on the [REDACTED]

21

22 CAD# 2506050043

23

24 Because St. Joseph Hospital is located in the City of Eureka, it is the practice of the hospital to call the Eureka
25 Police Department any time that a patient detained on a [REDACTED] hold elopes from their facility. I checked
26 prior calls for service at that hospital and located a call for service that corresponded with the information we
27 had received.

28

29 I located a call for service (CAD# 2506050043) that had been made to the Eureka Police Department by hospital
30 staff on 06/05/2025 at 0617 hours. This call was received in the morning preceding the officer involved shooting.
31 A female staff member identifying herself as [REDACTED] phone police reporting a patient had just fled from the
32 hospital. [REDACTED] identified the patient as [REDACTED] which was the alias that [REDACTED] had used.
33 [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] had been in their ER and was on a [REDACTED] She reported that
34 [REDACTED] had significant lacerations to his arms and that he was being prepped for surgery when he fled from
35 the hospital. She reported he was last seen running out of the back door of the ER wearing a hospital gown, and
36 that he had been last seen entering the wooded greenbelt area on the north side of the hospital.

37

38 Officers Cole and Tagaropoulos responded to the area and attempted to locate the man but were ultimately
39 unable to locate him. They requested a county teletype be issued requesting that a welfare check be conducted
40 on the man if located.

2 During my communication with Investigator Henderson, I learned that he had spoke with a woman who he
3 identified as [REDACTED] reported to him that [REDACTED] had approached her at her residence
4 on 06/05/2025, acting strangely.

5
6 I checked prior calls and located an incident from that same day in which [REDACTED] had contacted the Eureka
7 Police Department to report a suspicious male (CAD# 2506050118). [REDACTED] had phoned the Eureka Police
8 Department reporting a man had walked into her yard from the forest behind her residence. She described the
9 man as having a bandage over his arm, but that he had blood all over his arm and hand. [REDACTED] reported
10 that she had locked herself inside her home and the man had been last seen going back into the woods.

11
12 I noted that [REDACTED] residence ([REDACTED] "W" Street) was located approximately two blocks to the south of St.
13 Joseph Hospital (2700 Dolbeer Street). The densely wooded green belt area behind [REDACTED] residence is
14 the same green belt area where [REDACTED] had been seen fleeing into when he fled St. Joseph Hospital.

15
16 I obtained digital recordings of the phone calls made by [REDACTED] and St. Joseph Hospital staff. Those
17 recording were booked as evidence on the EPD server.

BACKGROUND

On June 5, 2025, Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) deputies were confronted by an individual with a knife. One deputy fired their service weapon when the individual advanced towards the deputies while they were backing away from him. The individual was transported to a local hospital where he was pronounced deceased. The multi-agency Humboldt County Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) was activated and the Eureka Laboratory was contacted to assist.

FIELD ACTIVITIES

I responded with Criminalist [REDACTED]. We initially responded to the HCSO office for a briefing at 1630 hours on June 5, 2025. During the briefing body-worn camera footage from both involved deputies was played; three gunshots were audible on the recordings. We departed from the briefing at approximately 1715 hours and arrived at the scene at approximately 1735 hours on the same day.

The shooting event was located at the intersection of Keisner and Brenard Roads in Loleta, California. The area was divided into two smaller crime scenes, each demarcated by crime scene tape and monitored by uniformed law enforcement officers. Through-traffic was controlled between the two scenes by additional uniformed law enforcement officers.

Primary Scene

The shooting location was marked off as the primary scene. Three vehicles were present on a short section of Keisner Road, northeast of Brenard Road. The short section of Keisner Road was approximately 87 feet in length and ended at a grassy field that wrapped around the road spur. A [REDACTED] Lexus model CT200h four-door hatchback car was parked facing northeast towards the end of Keisner Road. Two HCSO patrol vehicles were parked on Keisner Road, southwest of the Lexus. One expended cartridge case (item DC2) was recovered from the sidewalk between the Lexus and grassy field. Two additional expended cartridge cases (items DC3 and DC4) were located in the field adjacent to the sidewalk. The three cartridge cases formed a linear group south of the Lexus. Medical supplies, medical waste, and a folding knife (item DC1) were located south of the cartridge cases in the grassy field.

A red stain was observed on the rocker panel below the Lexus' driver's door. I did not screen or collect the stain. No other obvious red stains were observed to the exterior of the Lexus. Examination of the Lexus, including its interior and contents, was left for future processing by Eureka Police Department Forensic Analyst [REDACTED]

FIELD ACTIVITIES (continued)

Secondary Scene

A [REDACTED] Ford four-door model F350 was parked on Keisner Road, southwest of both Brenard Road and the primary scene. A single bullet entrance hole was observed near the lower leading edge of the right front passenger door. No other bullet damage was observed to the truck's exterior. The truck was towed from the scene for additional processing at a later time.

With the assistance of Criminalist [REDACTED], I documented the primary and secondary scenes with sketches, photographs, and a FARO 3D laser scanner. The FARO laser scanner data was given to Eureka Police Department Forensic Analyst [REDACTED] to be processed with her own FARO scanner data. I collected the folding knife and expended cartridge cases; refer to the evidence section of this report for details. Criminalist [REDACTED] and I departed the scene at approximately 2000 hours.

Additional Evidence Processing

I responded with Criminalist [REDACTED] to the HCSO Boatyard at [REDACTED] Myrtle Avenue in Eureka, California, on June 6, 2025, to process the Ford F350 truck. We arrived at approximately 1145 hours. The truck was located in a fenced and secured yard; tape seals were present on all four doors and the hood. I removed the inner door panel to recover a single expended bullet (item DC5) from within the right front passenger door; refer to the evidence section of this report for details. I re-installed the door panel and confirmed the functionality of the door's latching and locking mechanisms. The truck was not otherwise examined. We departed the boatyard at approximately 1215 hours.

1 On 6/5/25 I was working on duty as a Forensic Analyst for the Eureka Police Department when I was notified that
2 HCSO personnel had been involved in an officer involved shooting in the Loleta area. I am a member of the
3 Humboldt County Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) and attended a briefing for assignment of duties at
4 approximately 1630 hours.

5
6 I was assigned to assist with documentation and evidence collection at the shooting scene, which was located
7 near the intersection of Brenard and Keisner at the Bear River Band of the Rohnerville Rancheria. I arrived on
8 scene at approximately 1730 hours and observed yellow police perimeter tape sectioning off two separate areas
9 just north and south of the previously mentioned intersection.

10
11 North of the intersection was a small stretch of paved road that terminated after approximately 100 feet. I
12 observed a [redacted] Lexus CT200h bearing CA License [redacted] parked near the east curbline. Two marked HCSO
13 SUV's (bearing CA Exempt License [redacted] and License [redacted]) were parked slightly southwest of the Lexus
14 on the same stretch of road. East of this paved area was a grassy lawn, where I observed scattered medical
15 supplies. I recognized this area from the body worn camera footage as the approximate location where the
16 incident occurred.

17
18 South of the intersection, I observed a [redacted] Ford F-150 [redacted] bearing CA License [redacted] parked near the
19 east curbline. The vehicle had an apparent strikemark from a projectile in the front passenger side door (close to
20 the hinge area). DOJ Senior Criminalist [redacted] examined the vehicle on scene and made attempts to retrieve
21 the projectile from the side panel (please refer to his report for further information).

22
23 I took several scans of the scene utilizing a Faro Focus Premium scanner (active calibration certificate #LLS31012-
24 20230117-TH). DOJ personnel additionally utilized their Faro Focus scanner to scan portions of the scene. I was
25 provided with a MicroSD card containing the scan data from DOJ. These scans were later rendered into a 3D scan
26 that was secured on the M:DRIVE as ITEM 4090-2.

28 Three (3) cartridge cases and a folding knife were secured from the scene as evidence by DOJ Senior Criminalist
29 [redacted]

32 On 6/12/25 at approximately 1300 hours, I assisted HCSO Det. Taylor and APD Det. Sgt. Altizer with performing a
33 search on the [redacted] vehicle. HCSO Det. Taylor secured several items as evidence (please refer to her report

167 went. Sounded like the guy was becoming somewhat uncooperative and sounded like he'd given
168 a fake name to Corporal Brown and then stated that he had two broken wrists and was in a car
169 accident. So Corporal Brown had me just patrol the area to see if I could find a car accident. I
170 didn't locate any car accident or signs of one in the area. And then he requested I respond to his
171 location. I showed up. It looked like Corporal Brown had already kind of moved the guy along.
172 He was getting dressed and medical had shown up. Wrapped some large injury on his wrist,
173 which I didn't see. Sounded like Brown took a picture of it and showed it to me once I got there.
174 And it was a large, like splayed open, some sort of laceration. But the guy didn't want to go to
175 the hospital. They had wrapped it for him. Corporal Brown then tells me the guy's acting very
176 strange. Don't really know what's going on. He wanted an ambulance, but then refused to go with
177 them. Do you think he has a car on scene? We don't really know what car is his. We find a car in
178 the parking lot with some damage. Run it comes back to not the name that the guy gave us.
179 There's no blood in the car or anything like that. While we're kind of looking at this car, the guy
180 gets up and starts to walk up towards the casino. And we had been told that the tribe didn't want

181 him on the property anymore. So he's looked like he was going to walk up to singly and then
182 down the hill to get off the property. After he's already walking away, the security or I don't even
183 know what that guy was, the initial RP for the call. So janitor, maintenance guy, whatever he
184 was, says he got a hold of his security and they said they saw him get out of this car that we had
185 just ran. Well, this is strange. Like now he's walking away and has a car. Like, why doesn't he
186 just go get his car and leave? So we walked back to his car and like, make sure we didn't miss
187 anything. Like nothing's odd. And then we drive up to the smoke shop where he had stopped and
188 sat down to be like, hey, they don't want you here. You got to go. This was my first real like
189 interaction with the guy. And so I'm sitting there talking to him. Corporal Brown's talking to him
190 and he's giving us very short answers. Like, we'll ask him something and he acts kind of
191 suspicious of us, kind of standoffish and just off, like kind of has a like his head's thinking about
192 other things while we're talking to him. And we kind of go on back and forth like, hey, you got to
193 go. They don't want you here. And he just kind of stands there and stares at us. So I step in and
194 I'm like, we're just trying to help. Like, you clearly have an injury, but you don't want to go to the
195 hospital. Acting a little odd. Like you were told to leave, but you didn't go get in your car. You're
196 now telling us that it is your car. Like, this is all very confusing. Like, how can we help you?
197 And you're acting so strangely that now they don't want you here. So you got to go. Our only
198 option is to take you to jail but that's not a good option, because then we got to take you to the
199 hospital and you don't want to do either of those things. Like, you can just go. Again, he just kind
200 of stands there and stares at us and gives some strange comments. He finally goes to walk away
201 and then tells me and Corporal Brown that there's too many cops here. And it's just the two of us.
202 He points down at some trucks that were in front of the rec center still where we had initially
203 contacted him, thinking that they were somehow cops, even though they're clearly standard
204 trucks. He doesn't like it, wants us to go tell them to move away so we can get to his car. He ends
205 up... Finally, those trucks just drive away. Like, they were either just patrons or employees, and
206 they just drive away, not knowing any of this conversation is happening. And he starts to walk
207 away. And I just start talking to some gentleman that's charging his electric vehicle there. Go
208 turns back around and says to me, like, yes, how old I am. Thirty one? Why?
209 You're just curious? And he's again, he's being odd. Like, so I walk up to him and he says, like,
210 what's your first name? Brad, Bradford. And then he just kind of stares. Why? He's not really
211 giving me an answer. We're kind of going back and forth a little bit. Can I have this? Like, we
212 just stand there for, like, I don't know, 30 seconds just staring. Like, this is strange. I
213 believe Corporal Brown says something to the effect of, like, looks like you want to tell us
214 something. Like, were you assaulted? Like, can we help you somehow? Like, what's going on?
215 And then he just stares at us more and goes to walk away. As I'm walking away he ask me again
216 how old are you again thirty one. Then he walks off, gets in his car. So we just clearly seeing,
217 like, this is strange. The guy is just behaving oddly. So we sit basically in front of our patrol cars,
218 still at the smoke shop. He walks down, gets in his car, drives past us. And we're initially just
219 going to drive out and, like, basically follow him. Make sure he leaves. But he parks in front of
220 the smoke shop on Singley, which there's not really a shoulder there. There's not really a place to
221 park. So this is odd. Like, they pulled over to, like, get his music going or something. Like, I
222 don't know, but it's just weird. So, like, well, let's just park we can see him, but a little away. And
223 just, like, see if he just moves along on his own volition. We're sitting there. The car, to note, was
224 registered out of [REDACTED]. Like, this is weird. Like, I wonder if they have contacts with
225 him. So Corporal Brown called [REDACTED] PD. They said they didn't have contacts with him,

226 but the car was registered out of their SO's jurisdiction. So we call over there. They had some
227 interactions with the guy. So nothing, no [REDACTED], no public intoxication, nothing suspicious, like
228 some assault and battery report, but nothing that matched this behavior. So we're still like, this is
229 very odd. I don't know what's happening. And basically, as we're having this conversation, he,
230 the car starts, watch it make a U-turn back towards us, turns in front of us, and we're parked door
231 to door, but slanted off so I could open my door if I needed to and he pulls past me and right in
232 front. We both jump out of the car, what's going on? I walk up, basically my hood. He opens the
233 door to kind of like slowly gets out, kicks his feet out. It's like, what's going on? And or
234 something to that effect. And that was my foot, sorry. And he says again, I think he says, like,
235 I'm just fucking done or something like that. And then pops over the car with a knife in his hand.
236 I hear Brown unholster, I unholster, we go gunpoint, tell him to drop it. We start backing away.
237 And initially, he's just walking slowly towards us. He's walking. We keep trying to make space.
238 There's a road that's right behind us. So I can turn away from the road so I can walk up this
239 grassy hill because it's probably the best place to just keep walking. Again, he initially like just
240 walk slow. give him a few command to stop, get on the ground. And as I get to the grass, I'm
241 walking uphill on a grassy hill with somebody at gunpoint, and he's still coming at me with the
242 knife, he breaks into a faster sprint with his knife above his head. So I shoot, I believe, three
243 times. I genuinely believed he once he broke into the sprint that he was about to stab me. So I
244 shot. As soon as I watched him fall, I stopped shooting. We verified the knife was no longer in
245 his hand. Got him in handcuffs. Corporal Brown has a lot more medical training than I do. He's a
246 firefighter, volunteer firefighter. So I told him to go grab his med kit. He put out at that point to
247 start medical code three and additional units. I pulled up a shirt to assess where his injuries were.
248 And he had a center mass shot right through his chest plate. I realized there wasn't a ton I could
249 do without my medical kit on me. So I was waiting for Brown to come back with his. As soon as
250 he got there, we started working on getting wounds packed. But that's a hard wound to pack.
251 Watched his vitals. Make sure he's still breathing. Had a pulse, monitored him until we lost those
252 things and then started CPR and waited for additional personnel to show up.

253 **Destry Henderson:**

254 okay is that?

255 **Bradford Anderson:**

256 I think so. I think that's everything. I'm sure you have some questions.

257 **Destry Henderson:**

258 Yes. What we didn't mention is you watched your body camera footage prior to the two videos
259 that I provided you. Are those all the videos that you think you that you can remember?

260 **Bradford Anderson:**

261 Yeah, as far as I know.

262 **Destry Henderson:**

263 Okay. So let's go back to the beginning of some of the stuff. Where were you at when you
264 respond to that call?

265 **Bradford Anderson:**

266 Where did I get dispatched from?

267 **Destry Henderson:**

268 Yes.

269 **Bradford Anderson:**

270 The office.

271 **Destry Henderson:**

272 okay And you said there was a fake name. Did you see that on a call for service or did you hear
273 some radio traffic that led you to believe that or?

274 **Bradford Anderson:**

275 Yeah, I heard Corporal Brown requested a local on somebody with the name of their birth and
276 stated, I believe he's giving me a false name or something to that effect, at least. And then he
277 came back clear UTL, which basically means he get that clear of any wants or warrants. And
278 they were unable to locate a driver's license, which is usually indicative of somebody's giving
279 you a false name.

280 **Destry Henderson:**

281 Do you remember what that name was by chance?

282 **Bradford Anderson:**

283 I don't.

284 **Destry Henderson:**

285 okay so you didn't know anything about it. Did you ever talk to Corporal Brown on the phone
286 while you were responding or anything like that?

287 **Bradford Anderson:**

288 No.

289 **Destry Henderson:**

290 Is there any instances that you're describing to us that aren't on body worn camera.

291 **Bradford Anderson:**

292 like interactions?

293 **Destry Henderson:**

294 Yes.

295 **Bradford Anderson:**

296 Yeah. So when I first showed up again, I got out of my car and I realized the guy was already
297 packing up and getting dressed. I think he was going to leave. So I didn't activate my body cam
298 at that point. We didn't really have any interactions with him at that point. Stood there, waited for
299 him to get his belongings and move on. So the whole interaction where we go run the car and
300 Brown talks to me about his initial interactions that he had with the guy. And then when the
301 security tells us or the maintenance guy tells us that security had seen him on video, get out of
302 the car. I got none of that's on body cam.

303 **Destry Henderson:**

304 So that initial contact, I'm just going to use the locker room because I think there's a locker room
305 in there.

306 **Bradford Anderson:**

307 All of this is outside.

308 **Destry Henderson:**

309 The fun center is like a little closer towards the entrance. So it's like that second building.

310 **Bradford Anderson:**

311 Yeah.

312 **Destry Henderson:**

313 So we'll just call it the locker room.

314 **Bradford Anderson:**

315 That's fine.

316 **Destry Henderson:**

317 Is that where the initial content that you see him packing up at?

318 **Bradford Anderson:**

319 Yeah, exactly.

320 **Destry Henderson:**

321 And from that location, I mean, I have a couple of overhead googles.

322 **Bradford Anderson:**

323 Sure.

324 **Destry Henderson:**

325 Close enough for you. Where's his car parked from where you guys are?

326 **Bradford Anderson:**

327 okay so this is the casino. This is the smoke shop. This is family fun center. Yes, this is the rec center.

329 **Destry Henderson:**

330 So there might be one that's zoomed a little further that.

331 **Bradford Anderson:** Yeah, there we go. So his car is like parked right here. So again...

332 **Destry Henderson:**

333 that's fine.

334 **Bradford Anderson:**

335 Yeah. So like we are parked in front here. It doesn't work. And then his, yeah thank you, so we're parked up front right here. He is sitting against the pillar here. And his car is parked somewhere in this like general vicinity in this parking lot,

338 **Destry Henderson:**

339 which is the one that kind of is right next to the main.

340 **Bradford Anderson:**

341 Correct.

342 **Destry Henderson:**

343 Like community center building or whatever.

344 **Bradford Anderson:**

345 Exactly.

346 **Destry Henderson:**

347 and who tells you someone tells you that's his vehicle?

348 **Bradford Anderson:**

349 So initially, one of the other tribal employees, we just asked, like, does he have a car here? And she walked away and came back with a picture of a license plate. This is the only car that he damaged in the parking lot. So we ran it, ran the who the car was registered to come back clear. And then as he's walking away to come sit by the smoke shop, the again, the maintenance guy or whoever was an initial [REDACTED]. at the rec center said, hey, my security just called. He did get out of that car. He pulled in and got out of that car.

355 **Destry Henderson:**

356 okay.

357 **Bradford Anderson:**

358 yeah

359 **Destry Henderson:**

360 OK. And then there's a during the contacts, if your okay with this by the charging center, you

361 know, where the guy's charging his car.

362 **Bradford Anderson:**

363 Oh, yes, yes, yes, yes.

364 **Destry Hendeson:**

365 Where you're contacting him on video. So there's comment you're telling you're both telling him
366 that he's been trespassed off the property.

367 **Bradford Anderson:**

368 Correct.

369 **Destry Hendeson:**

370 Do you know where that who wanted him off the property?

371 **Bradford Anderson:**

372 So I had asked the as he was walking away, I asked the maintenance guy, like, hey, is he good to
373 stay or like you guys want him off the property? He's like, no, we wanted him gone. My security
374 just called me and said they wanted him gone.

375 **Destry Hendeson:**

376 okay So you were under the belief that he had the authority to say this guy's not allowed here.

377 **Bradford Anderson:**

378 Absolutely. I believe he was an agent of the tribe to some degree.

379 **Destry Hendeson:**

380 OK. Um, so then I'm trying to remember the video as well. So at some point you the video goes
381 off because he's walking towards the exit, which is like Singley and Bernard right there. Is that
382 correct? Or he walks towards the smoke shack further.

383 **Bradford Anderson:**

384 So again, like my body cams not on here when during this interaction, my first body cam is by
385 this charging station at the smoke shop. He begins to walk back to his car and that's what I turn
386 off.

387 **Destry Hendeson:**

388 And then when you said he parks on Singley, so he goes out of Brenard's off the housing
389 property, he's parked on that main thouroughfare.

390 **Bradford Anderson:**

391 Okay. Yeah. He's park right in front of the smoke shop here.

392 **Destry Hendeson:**

393 Um, so you guys wait in that little Alcove or whatever.

394 **Bradford Anderson:**

395 Yeah.

396 **Destry Hendeson:**

397 Just to see what he's going to do.

398 **Bradford Anderson:**

399 Exactly.

400 **Destry Hendeson:**

401 Okay.

402 **Bradford Anderson:**

403 Basically like we wanted him off the property, but he'd been acting so, I don't even want to say
404 unpredictable, but just off. Um, didn't know if he was going to leave, didn't know, we also didn't
405 want to push the issue, like give him some space. If he needs like to just sit in his car for a

406 minute, fine. We aren't going to rush this. Um, so we were just going to let him sit there for a
407 minute. Again, we're also on the phone with [REDACTED] SO, I don't know if that's the SO's
408 name, but, um, trying to like gather a little more information about him in the meantime.

409 **Destry Hendeson:**

410 And, uh, paramedics have already gone by the time you're on scene.

411 **Bradford Anderson:**

412 Yeah. They're already gone

413 **Destry Hendeson:**

414 Totally gone and you saw only Kellen just showed you a photograph of the injury

415 **Bradford Anderson:**

416 Correct

417 **Destry Hendeson:**

418 on his left arm, right?

419 **Bradford Anderson:**

420 Yes.

421 **Destry Hendeson:**

422 And then there's in that shortly after the aftermath of the charging station, you say, Oh, maybe
423 he's on [REDACTED] or something. Can you explain that to me?

424 **Bradford Anderson:**

425 Yeah, absolutely. Um, I realized I say that almost factually, like that could be what's going on.
426 Um, I think at the time I'm more just searching for why is this guy so off? Um, I've seen a lot of
427 people high on drugs in general as a general sense. And it's not really matching anything to that
428 degree. Um, he's having like articulate conversation when you put the things he's saying, right?
429 So it doesn't seem like he's drunk high, having like a mental break per se. He's just being off.

430 Um, the only other time I've seen something to that degree or anything similar is psychedelics.

431 But again, I would have expected to see other signs and symptoms of that. And he's not showing
432 any of those. I mean, so again, like seemed like he was plenty good to drive and I didn't really
433 have any suspicion that he was under the influence, but I think I was just kind of searching for
434 like, why is he acting so off?

435 **Destry Hendeson:**

436 Okay. So you touched on the drive. There was no concern that he was going to be a danger to the
437 public by driving away.

438 **Bradford Anderson:**

439 No

440 **Destry Hendeson:**

441 He was just had an odd mannerisms.

442 **Bradford Anderson:**

443 Exactly.

444 **Destry Hendeson:**

445 Okay. And then we'll just call him security. I don't know what that person was

446 **Bradford Anderson:**

447 Sure

448 **Destry Hendeson:**

449 Said they saw surveillance, but you guys never, you never saw surveillance

450 **Bradford Anderson:**

451 No

452 **Destry Hendeson:**

453 Of him getting out of that vehicle.

454 **Bradford Anderson:**

455 No

456 **Destry Hendeson:**

457 Um, what kind of options did you think about to resolve the issue there if he wasn't going to

458 leave? What were your options? you thought?

459 **Bradford Anderson:**

460 Like once he parks here or initially

461 **Destry Hendeson:**

462 when you're talking to him at the charging station, he's given, I think we could both agree. He's

463 given a ton of conditionals like, Hey, if you get those people to move, I'll leave.

464 **Bradford Anderson:**

465 Yeah

466 **Destry Hendeson:**

467 If you guys, you know, reduce the amount of cops, I'll leave.

468 **Bradford Anderson:**

469 mhmm

470 **Destry Hendeson:**

471 At that point you verbalize, there's only two of us here. I don't know what you're talking about.

472 **Bradford Anderson:**

473 mHmm

474 **Destry Hendeson:**

475 Um, so talk to me about what you're thinking about regarding like, how are we going to

476 resolve this issue with him getting off the tribal property.

477 **Bradford Anderson:**

478 Yeah. I think, and I even say it to him, like, look, our only real option if you don't leave is to

479 arrest you. That doesn't seem like a good option. Um, really, like if he would have just sat there,

480 we would have sat there and talked to him until we could come to some reasonable conclusion,

481 which is a lot of this job is just talking and convincing people to do things you want a lot of the

482 time. But ultimately, like if he just absolutely refused to leave and that was not going to happen,

483 like we would have pursued the arrest for a 602.

484 **Destry Hendeson:**

485 Okay. So I guess that kind of leads into the question, you know, kind of a difficult one

486 **Bradford Anderson:**

487 mhmm

488 **Destry Hendeson:**

489 His injury didn't prevent cause you knew you had to be medically cleared.

490 **Bradford Anderson:**

491 100 percent

492 **Destry Hendeson:**

493 It was going to take hours,

494 **Bradford Anderson:**

495 100%

496 **Destry Hendeson:**

497 Did not influence you not arresting him. No, you didn't avoid the arrest name because he had a
498 significant injury.

499 **Bradford Anderson:**

500 No. And I think Kellen also says that on body cam, like, and we can't just take you straight to
501 jail. We have to go get you medically cleared and you didn't want to go to the hospital. Like, so
502 something we would have done. If that was an option. But oftentimes arresting people is the last
503 option, which if you want to leave, then leave. Like that's what everybody wants.

504 **Destry Hendeson:**

505 Okay. And now I want to bring up, cause. I saw the interaction when he asked for your name and
506 you said he had it like a blank stare. His dad's name is [REDACTED]. Does that
507 make you think anything different about his response to your name when you're right there?

508 **Bradford Anderson:**

509 I mean, that is strange. Um,

510 **Jonathan Murphy:**

511 What's his dad's name

512 **Destry Hendeson:**

513 [REDACTED]

514 **Jonathan Murphy:**

515 Oh no shit.

516 **Destry Hendeson:**

517 Yeah.

518 **Bradford Anderson:**

519 That is strange

520 **Destry Hendeson:**

521 So I want to know if you thought he reacted now knowing that part based on that charging center
522 reaction. Like my name's Brad, but actually Bradford. And then you said he had like a,

523 **Bradford Anderson:**

524 maybe would that influence somebody? Absolutely. I mean, find me people with my dad's name.

525 I think, huh, that's strange. That's my dad's name. But that's about all it is. Um, obviously I don't

526 know any of his family history. Like that could be an influence in some degree, but I don't know.

527 **Destry Hendeson:**

528 Okay.

529 **Bradford Anderson:**

530 Um, that interaction was also very,

531 [REDACTED]:

532 Just not to be vague about influence.

533 **Bradford Anderson**

534 Yes.

535 [REDACTED]:

536 Do you mean just impacted generally?

537 **Bradford Anderson:**

538 Just in general. Yeah.

539 [REDACTED]:

540 **Bradford Anderson:**

541 I mean

542 [REDACTED]

543 Cause I mean his reaction was eventually to pull a knife out.

544 **Bradford Anderson:**

545 Sure.

546 [REDACTED]:

547 So I just make sure we're not all, cause it could be from the line, it could be construed from some
548 other party listening that a natural reaction to someone having the same name as your dad is to
549 charge it with a knife.

550 **Bradford Anderson:**

551 No, no, no.

552 [REDACTED]:

553 and that is somehow understandable.

554 [REDACTED]:

555 Which I don't believe that anybody is thinking about the table, but just, you know, in
556 generalities, just be more specific

557 **Bradford Anderson:**

558 I think what I was trying to say is the it's a quip. Like it's if I meet somebody with my same
559 name, I go, Hey, that's my name. I don't say that phrase to people when that's not the same name.
560 Um, it's something that you note on, by all means.

561 **Destry Hendeson:**

562 Ok.

563 **Bradford Anderson:**

564 Um, I don't

565 **Destry Hendeson:**

566 Cause then we fast forward to, he pulls in, you're the first one that contact comes towards your
567 direction. Um, I think from the video we could say that that's just because you were his first line
568 of sight or why do you think he chose towards coming, chose to come towards you, I guess
569 would be the best question.

570 **Bradford Anderson:**

571 I don't know why. Um, obviously Kellen had spent more time with him than I had cause he had
572 the first whole interaction with him prior to me arriving. Um, I don't really know. Um, I was also
573 very friendly the whole time with him. And then he calls me over basically, Hey, what's your
574 name? How old are you? And we have this interaction there that felt very strange. Um,
575 confrontational is the wrong word cause it wasn't a confrontational thing, but it felt very much
576 like tense for no real reason. He's just asking me if you will do this in this job, what's your first
577 name? Like I don't care. You can have my first name. I get it. That doesn't bother me. Um, and it
578 felt very strange. And even in the midst of that, we asked him again, like, can we help you
579 somehow? Um, but I do think at that point he kind of walked onto me and I don't know why.
580 Um, that makes sense if that's his dad's name. Like if he's having some sort of mental break of
581 some sort, I mean, people often latch onto random things, seemingly insignificant at times, but,
582 um, but I will say he, when he got out of the car from my understanding is Kellen. We were both
583 in our cars when we saw him pull in and we got out and Kellen said hey I'll go to the other side,
584 um, so from my understanding Kellen was like on the opposite side of the hood of me. So, I
585 mean, we're kind of both in the same eyesight. Um, but he definitely locked straight onto me and

586 I don't know why frankly.

587 **Destry Hendeson:**

588 Um, so tell me about him having a knife pulled out, where'd it come from?

589 **Bradford Anderson:**

590 I don't know where in the car he had it. Um, but basically he kicked his feet out of the car from
591 my recollection, kicked his feet out and kind of like sat in that position for a minute, um, stood
592 up and said, again, some of the fact of like, I'm, I'm just done or I'm just fucking done something
593 to that effect. Um, and then unfolded the knife.

594 **Destry Hendeson:**

595 Okay.

596 **Bradford Anderson:**

597 Um, and then just started walking towards us.

598 **Destry Hendeson:**

599 And you could see the blade.

600 **Bradford Anderson:**

601 Yes.

602 **Destry Hendeson:**

603 And I mean, just for the recording, when you say a minute, are you referring to that?

604 Just being a moment of time

605 **Bradford Anderson:**

606 Just a moment of time. Yeah.

607 **Destry Hendeson:**

608 Time turns around. So you could, at that point you can see that he has a knife blade and then
609 what happens?

610 **Bradford Anderson:**

611 He just, again, his eyes were kind of just locked on me. Um, so I unholstered, told him, Hey, put
612 that down or something to that effect. I think, um, he kept walking. I heard Kellen yell a few
613 commands. Obviously I just watched the body cam, but I don't remember what he said. Um,
614 again, I start like trying to get some more space from him as he's just walking. Um, give him
615 some more command, stop, drop the knife, get on the ground. Um, and then he just full charges.
616 Basically he goes from holding the knife by his side to over his head and then charges at me
617 more or less a sprint.

618 **Destry Hendeson:**

619 And what did that mean to you when he did that?

620 **Bradford Anderson:**

621 That he was going to try to stab me,

622 **Destry Hendeson:**

623 which would do what?

624 **Bradford Anderson:**

625 Likely kill me or create some great bodily injury of some sort.

626 **Destry Hendeson:**

627 Uh, did you think of any other options that you had at that time during?

628 **Bradford Anderson:**

629 It happened so fast that I don't feel like I had any other options.

630 **Destry Hendeson:**

631 Now with the, as you saw on the fish eye, of the body worn camera doesn't really give us
632 distance. I'm not expecting you to be an expert about distances. Also, um, he was removed from
633 the scene by the time that I got there. Right. So, um, obviously we know where the cars were, but
634 that's it. So kind of give me some rough estimates on distances as you're backing up and how far
635 away you think he was. Let's start with, how far do you think he was when he started running
636 towards you?

637 **Bradford Anderson:**

638 initially running

639 **Destry Hendeson:**

640 Yeah

641 **Bradford Anderson:**

642 I'm going to say probably 20, 25 feet initially.

643 **Destry Hendeson:**

644 Ok. And by the time you shot, how close do you think he was? approximately.

645 **Bradford Anderson:**

646 Less than 10.

647 **Destry Hendeson:**

648 Alright. Um. Does he say anything that during those, that interaction where he's walking and
649 then running towards you?

650 **Bradford Anderson:**

651 I don't remember.

652 **Destry Hendeson:**

653 Ok

654 **Bradford Anderson:**

655 And again, I know I just watched it, but I didn't cue into anything he was saying, but I don't, I
656 honestly don't know.

657 **Destry Hendeson:**

658 Ok. give me just one second. Rick, if you have anything, go ahead.

659 **Richard Bise:**

660 What made you stop shooting?

661 **Bradford Anderson:**

662 I saw him begin to fall indicating that I'd likely hit him and kind of ended this threat. Um, and
663 now it kind of turns into a medical condition and I need to go render aid to him.

664 **Destry Hendeson:**

665 Do you think any other type of tool that you had access to would have resulted in him being
666 compliant?

667 **Bradford Anderson:**

668 I don't think I had a chance to use any other tool

669 **Destry Hendeson:**

670 Ok

671 **Bradford Anderson:**

672 But.

673 **Destry Hendeson:**

674 Ok.

675 **Richard Bise:**

676 I noticed that you have a taser.

677 **Bradford Anderson:**

678 I do.

679 **Richard Bise:**

680 Um, and when you first initiated or when that he first initiated contact with you, you had your
681 vehicle between you and him.

682 **Bradford Anderson:**

683 mHmm

684 **Richard Bise:**

685 Um, what made you go for your lethal option first and not your less lethal?

686 **Bradford Anderson:**

687 I mean, initially the, the knife's a lethal threat, so I'm going to match force with force. Like I'm
688 going to go to lethal threat and if he would have stood there and just like in the doorway, we
689 would have had time to negotiate, switch other tools, other options, get more people. But he
690 immediately begins to walk towards me. Um, at this point, I'm essentially trying to create that
691 now of get some space, get some time, get some distance, try to get a moment to negotiate. And
692 again, it just like transpires so quickly that there's just not ever an opportunity to switch to
693 anything else.

694 **Destry Hendeson:**

695 Do you remember what you were feeling during that time? Emotionally?

696 **Bradford Anderson:**

697 Scared. I mean, for lack of a better phrase. Um, like I definitely thought like he was going to stab
698 me. Um, again initially, I think he, his statement initially sounded like, Oh, he's being suicidal,
699 right.

700 **Destry Hendeson:**

701 What statement are you referring to?

702 **Bradford Anderson:**

703 When he said, I'm just done.

704 **Destry Hendeson:**

705 Ok

706 **Bradford Anderson:**

707 Um, and again, like he's just walking initially, but it transitions to like very assaultive where he
708 raises the knife over his head and charges at me. Like he switched from [REDACTED] to like
709 homicidal. It felt like this big switch in the moment.

710 **Destry Hendeson:**

711 Ok

712 **Bradford Anderson:**

713 Um, does that make sense?

714 **Destry Hendeson:**

715 Sure.

716 **Richard Bise:**

717 And when you did make the decision to shoot, do you remember what you were aiming at?

718 **Bradford Anderson:**

719 Center mass of just like his chest area at him. But

720 **Richard Bise:**

721 Do you recall what your background was.

722 **Bradford Anderson:**

723 I didn't notice at the time. Like I knew like walking through it that the family fun center was
724 there, which is kind of my kick out on the Hill to try to get like the street as my backdrop. Cause
725 that was the best option I had. Um, but when I actually pulled the trigger, like again, he was
726 charging at me and like, that's what I saw. So

727 **Richard Bise:**

728 Ok. Did you want to get into his weapon and slow it out?

729 **Destry Hendeson:**

730 We can. Some of that was taken care of by processing. Um, did you see him with a knife before
731 that instant?

732 **Bradford Anderson:**

733 I didn't. But as you say that, I remember that at one point in my interaction with Kellen, he said,
734 Hey, just, you know, he's got a knife in his bag. Um, I think he had helped him gather the
735 property or something to the fact, I don't know how he knew that, but he was like, Hey, he's got a
736 knife in the back.

737 **Destry Hendeson:**

738 Okay.

739 **Bradford Anderson:**

740 Like everybody has knives on them.

741 **Destry Hendeson:**

742 When was, when did you learn that?

743 **Bradford Anderson:**

744 I believe that was like the charging station area at some point. Um, I don't remember exactly
745 because again, at the time it failed insignificant. I mean,

746 **Destry Hendeson:** okay. Um. So they did the officer download and everything like that. I know
747 they didn't ask any questions, but, uh, that's the weapon that you normally carry.

748 **Bradford Anderson:**

749 Yes.

750 **Destry Hendeson:**

751 You use that weapon at training.

752 **Bradford Anderson:**

753 Yes.

754 **Destry Hendeson:**

755 You qualified it recently.

756 **Bradford Anderson:**

757 Yes.

758 **Destry Hendeson:**

759 Um. Normal loadout. No one had access to your firearm before that.

760 **Bradford Anderson:**

761 No. Are you asking like a loadout as far as like round count

762 **Destry Hendeson:**

763 No. They said the load out and the loadout was that you had 17 in a firearm, including the one in
764 chamber and 16 in your spare mags.

765 **Bradford Anderson:**

766 Yes.

767 **Destry Henderson:**

768 Correct.

769 **Bradford Anderson:**

770 Correct.

771 **Destry Henderson:**

772 And then no one else had access to your firearm prior to that. Correct.

773 **Bradford Anderson:**

774 Correct.

775 **Destry Henderson:**

776 Um

777 [REDACTED]:

778 So he's just establishing that the gun as when it was reviewed by the techs after the scene was in

779 the same configuration that it was at the time that you fired.

780 **Bradford Anderson:**

781 Right.

782 **Destry Henderson:**

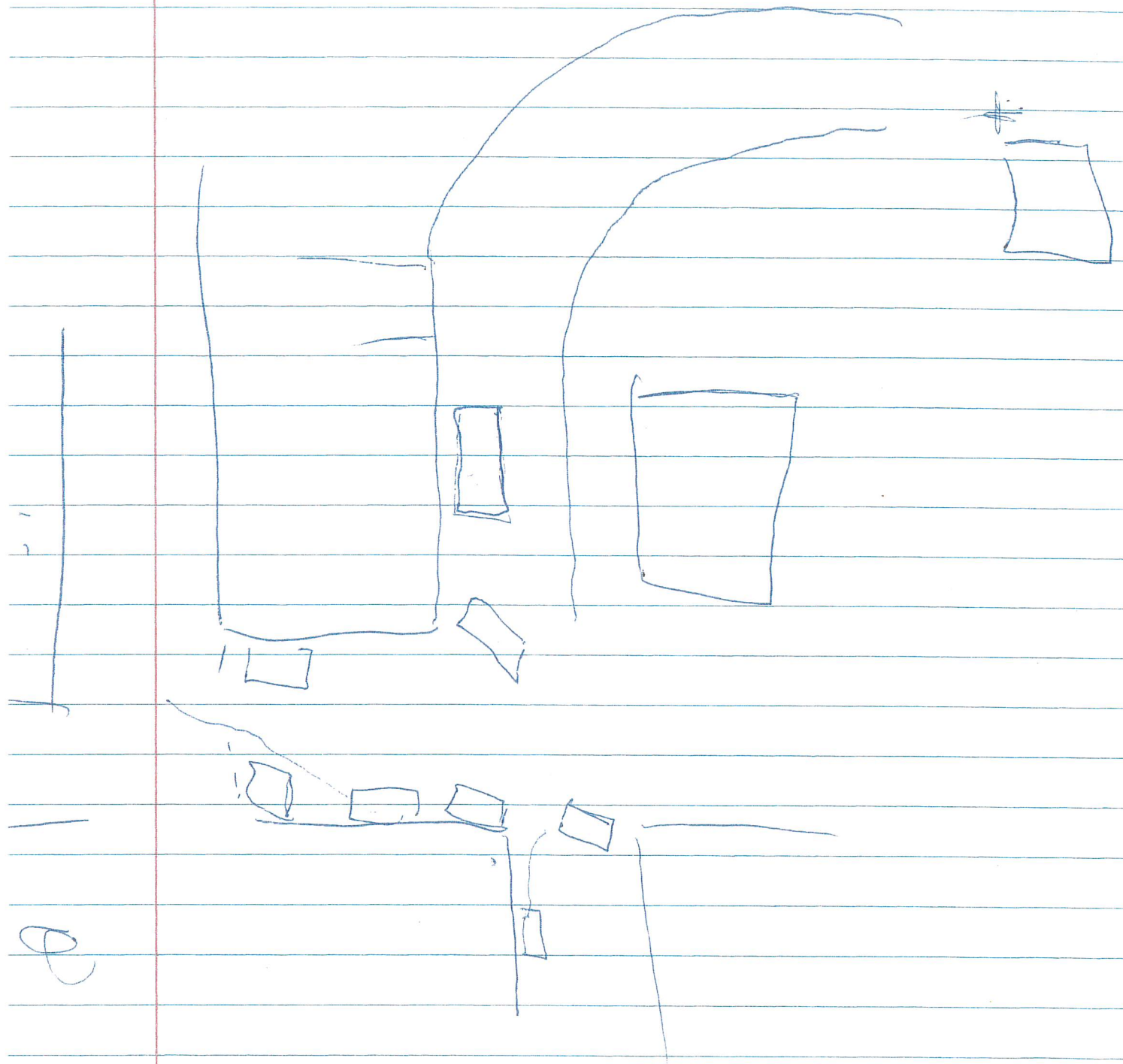

STATEMENT OF PROBABLE CAUSE

Your Affiant says that the facts in support of the search warrant are as follows:

I, Destry Henderson, being first duly sworn deposes and says; that on the between the 4th day of June, 2025 and the 5th day of June, 2025 the felony crime to wit: Violation of Section(s) 664/187(A) of the California Penal Code was committed by [REDACTED], at 263 Keisner in Loleta, California; in the following manner, to wit: Attempted murder on a peace officer.

On 06/05/2025, at approximately 1530hrs., HCSO Cpl. Brown and Cpl. Anderson were involved in an Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) with a male subject at the Bear River Recreation Center, 266 Kiesner Rd., in Loleta located in Humboldt County. The subject was transported to Redwood Memorial Hospital, 3300 Renner Dr., in Fortuna, CA 95540 where he was later pronounced deceased.

This area is within the property boundaries of the Bear River Rancheria and located across Singley Hill Rd. from the Bear River Casino, 11 Bear Paws Way in Loleta. This is a multiple acre complex, with several large commercial buildings, which includes the community center, recreation center, family fun center, and tobacco shop. The entire area is under surveillance and monitored by the casino surveillance team.

Reading the incident log in RiMs regarding the incident with the subject, I learned that Cpl. Brown initially responded to the Recreation Center after reading a medical aid transfer call that provided the following details:

In the Rec Center: male showed up with a bandaged bloody arm and is dripping blood everywhere.

From reviewing the body camera footage, reading the incident log, and conducting the investigation to the circumstances surrounding the shooting, up to the date of this affidavit, I believe the following information is correct.

Cpl. Brown arrived on scene just prior to emergency medical personal (EMS) and was able to obtain a first name of [REDACTED] from the subject. The subject was reluctant to provide his last name, but through contact with EMS Cpl. Brown learned the subject's last name was [REDACTED] with a DOB of [REDACTED]. The subject has just showered in the Rec Center and was wrapped in towels outside when Cpl. Brown contacted him. Employees advised patrons were in the sauna and unable to leave, due to so much blood on the floor.

HCSO dispatch could not find any contacts with that name. The subject advised he was in traffic collision sometime prior. Cpl. Brown requested Cpl. Anderson respond to his location as a cover unit and to check the local area for signs of collision.

EMS treated the subject for a large wound to his left arm, advising him he should go to the hospital for treatment. The subject refused to be transported to the hospital and EMS left after cleaning his wound and applying a new bandage.

The subject was contacted approximately 5-10 minutes later near the tobacco shop by deputies as the subject had not left the area and staff did not want him on the property. Employees from the community center had directed the deputies to a vehicle in the community center parking lot that the subject was associated with. This vehicle was identified by casino surveillance as being associated with the subject. The vehicle, a [REDACTED] Lexus sedan, CA# [REDACTED], had a registered owner by the name of [REDACTED]. Cpl. Brown and Cpl. Anderson contacted [REDACTED] and advised him he needed to leave the property. Cpl. Brown also expressed concern for [REDACTED] injury and wanted to help him. [REDACTED] was reluctant to speak with the Corporal's but engaged Cpl. Anderson in general conversation. This portion of the contact the Corporal's advised [REDACTED] that he was being "trespassed" from the property and that he needed to leave. Next, the Corporal's parked near the entrance of this large area in an unfinished section of road. This unfinished section of road is near the intersection Keiser and Bernad Rd and still on the Bear River Rancheria property.

[REDACTED] drove passed the Corporal's, stopped just beyond the entrance to Bernard Rd, in the west land of Shingley Hill Rd for a few moments, turned around and drove back toward Corporal's and stopped just past them at the end of the unfinished portion of the road. [REDACTED] vehicle was approximately 20-30 feet beyond where Cpl. Brown and Cpl. Anderson's vehicles are parked.

Both Corporal's got out of their vehicle to speak with [REDACTED]. In body worn camera footage, Cpl. Anderson said something that sounded like "yes sir?" in a questioning tone. Cpl. Anderson can be seen leaning on the hood of his patrol vehicle with his hands resting on the hood. [REDACTED] can be heard talking in the background, but I cannot understand what he was saying. Cpl. Anderson then directs the subject to "put that down right now," while drawing his firearm.

By watching both Cpl. Anderson's and Cpl. Brown's body worn camera footage I was able to determine the following. ██████ got out of his vehicle, was asked what the issue was by Cpl. Brown, then ██████ reaches into his pocket, pulls out a large folding knife, opens the knife and starts walking towards Cpl. Anderson with the knife held above his head in a threatening manner. Cpl. Anderson drew his weapon and gave ██████ commands to drop the knife while retreating backwards and away from ██████ approach. ██████ was given commands to drop the knife by both Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown. ██████ began to run at Cpl Anderson and Cpl. Anderson shot him when he was approximately 15 feet away.

Both Cpl. Anderson and Cpl. Brown provided medical aid unit paramedics arrived on scene. The subject was transported to Redwood Memorial Hospital where he was pronounced deceased.

The Humboldt County Coroner obtained a positive identification of the subject as ██████ DOB ██████. Through a medical records request from the coroner's office, I also learned ██████ was using the alias ██████ while at both hospitals.

Through this investigation I learned that Bear River Community Center has surveillance footage covering several areas of this incident. This information was relayed to be by CIRT team members Officer Gardner from Ferndale Police Department and California Highway Patrol Investigation Telloian.

By obtaining the surveillance footage sought in this affidavit, I believe it will help determine a motive for ██████ behavior and the attempt on Cpl. Anderson's life. It will also help determine a timeline of the events leading-up to his lethal encounter with law enforcement.

Items 013 and 020 are each Glock model 17 Gen 5 pistols. Both pistols were successfully test fired and determined to be functional.

Items DC2, DC3, and DC4 were each identified as expended 9mm Luger cartridge cases. The cartridge cases were compared to cartridge cases test fired in the items 013 and 020 Glock pistols. Based on correspondence of firearm-related class characteristics and sufficient agreement of individualizing characteristics, I determined that each of the three expended cartridge cases had been fired in the item 013 Glock pistol.

I determined that the item 013 Glock pistol was functional. Test-fired bullets and cartridge cases were retained as item 013T.

Item 020 is a Glock model 17 Gen 5 semi-automatic pistol and one intact 9mm Luger jacketed hollow point cartridge "from chamber." The pistol was marked with serial number [REDACTED] and was chambered for the 9mm Luger cartridge. I function tested and test fired the pistol three times in a semiautomatic fashion using a laboratory-supplied Glock pistol magazine and laboratory-supplied ammunition. I determined that the item 020 Glock pistol was functional. Test-fired bullets and cartridge cases were retained as item 020T.

Items DC2, DC3, and DC4 were each identified as expended 9mm Luger cartridge cases. The cartridge cases were compared to cartridge cases test fired in the item 013 and item 020 Glock pistols. Based on correspondence of firearm-related class characteristics and sufficient agreement if individualizing characteristics, I determined that each of the expended cartridge cases had been fired in the item 013 Glock pistol.

Associations and other results reported in this examination are based on the AFTE Theory of Identification and its Range of Conclusions. This basis enables opinions of common origin when unique surface contours of two toolmarks are in sufficient agreement.

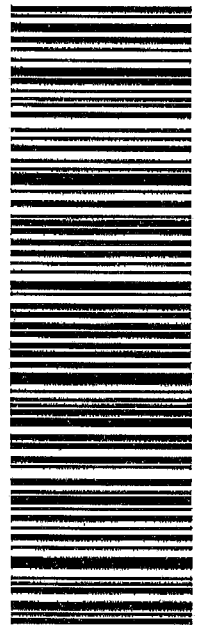

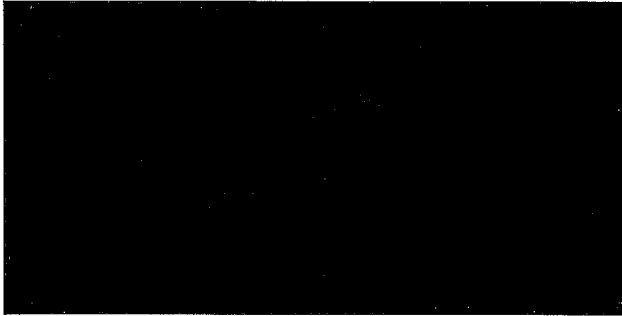

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EXTERNAL EXAMINATION

The body is received in a blue body bag.

Inscribed in black indelible ink on top of the body bag are in part the following "202502399 198#".

Attached to the top of the body with clear adhesive tape is a sealing red plastic tag which had been broken and is inscribed with "06855".

The zipperheads of the body bag had been sealed with another red plastic tag inscribed with "06803". The tags are photographed and documented. The red tag is broken and removed and handed over to Evidence Technician [REDACTED] who is present.

The body is removed from the body bag.

There is no other identifying nametag on the body.

The body is that of a well-developed, well-nourished [REDACTED] male weighing approximately 198 pounds, measuring approximately 73 inches and appearing to be consistent with the stated age of [REDACTED].

The body is unclad, unembalmed and reveals focal green cutaneous discoloration of the right lower abdominal quadrant.

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No article of jewelry is found on the body at autopsy.

The body had been refrigerated and the temperature of the body is cold to the touch. Rigor mortis is lysed in all joints. Purple, marked, fixed, livor mortis is noted over the dorsal surfaces of the body except in areas exposed to pressure where it is absent. The right and left hands and wrists had been covered with brown paper bags which had been secured at the levels of the wrists with adhesive red tape.

Attached to the distal tips of the body bags are yellow evidence police tapes. The bags are removed, photographed and documented and handed over to evidence Technician [REDACTED] who is present.

Found on the right wrist are green-white metal handcuffs with one of the cuffs locked around the right wrist and the other hanging freely. Inscribed on one of the surfaces of the cuffs is the following [REDACTED]. The cuff is removed by Detective Huihner. It is photographed, documented and handed over to the Evidence Technician [REDACTED] who is present.

Separately accompanying the body, presented to the autopsy suite by Deputy Coroner Cynthia Bartley is a compact disc containing whole-body digital CT scans, which are reviewed and reveal comminuted fractures of the

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neck of the left humerus, as well as radiopaque fragments of spicules of a bullet admixed with the comminuted fractures. There is a radiopaque bullet in the left lateral and rostral chest, as well as in the right medial thoracic back, with both bullets embedded in the subcutaneous tissues. The CT scans are saved.

Also separately accompanying the body, in a thumb drive presented to the autopsy suite by Deputy Coroner Hnilo, are whole body digital X-ray images, which are reviewed and reveal the findings described above in the CT scans. The X-rays are also saved.

The articles of clothing were not presented to the autopsy suite, and pictures of the articles of clothing were requested to be sent by District Attorney Investigator Bise on a later date.

The body reveals the following other identifying features:

1. The left toes are diffusely dystrophic and deformed and show six malformed toes which are hypoplastic with rudimentary nails.
2. There is a 35 x 3 cm inverse horseshoe shaped scar on the left lower abdominal quadrant.
3. There is a 2.5 x 1.4 cm oval scar on the right scapular back.
4. There is a 3.5 x 0.4 cm longitudinal scar on the right posterior forearm.

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5. There are brown-pink scabbing scratch abrasions on the left posterolateral distal forearm representing letters that are situated longitudinally from proximal to distal resembling the letters "██████," they are difficult to discern but are photographed and documented and appear to be an abraded tattoo.

The body reveals the following evidence of medical and surgical intervention:

1. There is an endotracheal tube inserted through the mouth.
2. There are adhesive defibrillator electrodes on the trunk.
3. There are multiple adhesive electrocardiograph electrodes on the trunk.
4. There is a blood-soaked cotton gauze bandage on the left medial supraclavicular fossa.
5. There is an intramedullary catheter inserted into the right distal and anterior thigh.
6. There is an intramedullary catheter inserted into the left anterior and proximal leg.
7. There is an inflatable sphygmomanometer cuff around the right leg.
8. There is an intravenous catheter inserted into the left antecubital fossa and held in place with adhesive tape.

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There is multifocal and sparse blood soiling of the bilateral anterior chest and the left arm.

At this time, under an aseptic protocol, nasopharyngeal swabs are taken and submitted for respiratory panel PCR.

The body reveals the following evidence of trauma:

I. GUNSHOT WOUND OF THE CHEST [BULLET RECOVERED]

a. Gunshot of entrance [Designated 'E1']:

There is a 0.7 cm in diameter circular perforating wound of the right medial chest located 52 cm below the level of the top of the head and 1.3 cm right of the anterior midline showing 0.2 cm in width circumferential red-purple marginal abrasions and contusions without soot deposits or powder stippling. There are diffuse circumferentially surrounding 10 x 5.5 cm red-pink contusions of the anterior chest surrounding the gunshot wound of entrance.

b. Pathway of the bullet:

The bullet perforated, contused and lacerated the skin and soft tissues of the right medial chest, perforated and fractured the sternum at the level of the 5th costal

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cartilage, perforated, contused and lacerated the soft tissues of the anterior mediastinum, perforated, contused and lacerated the anterior pericardium, perforated, contused and lacerated the epicardium and myocardium and endocardium of the anterior right basal ventricle, the atrioventricular septum, the right coronary artery, the anterior right atrium, passed across the right atrium and right ventricle to perforate, contuse and lacerate the posterior right atrium, perforated, contused and lacerated the right posterolateral pericardium, perforated, contused and lacerated the right lung at the hilum, perforated, contused and lacerated perihilar veins of the right lung, perforated, contused and lacerated through and through the lower lobe of the right lung and parietal pleura, perforated and fractured the right lateral 10th thoracic vertebra and right posterior 10th rib, perforated, contused and lacerated the right paravertebral thoracic soft tissues, perforated, contused and lacerated the soft tissues of the right medial and posterior thoracic back before it came to settle in the subcutaneous tissue of the right medial thoracic back.

Accompanying the track of the bullet are extensive soft tissue hemorrhages of the anterior mediastinum, extensive contusions and lacerations of the anterior and posterior pericardium, ragged transmural lacerations of the right basal ventricle, the right anterior atrium and the right posterior atrium. There are ragged 7.5 x 5 cm transmural lacerations and contusions of the right anterior ventricle and

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atrioventricular septum and right atrium. There is approximately 200 cc of residual liquid and clotted hemopericardium. There is global atelectasis of the right lung. There are through and through contusions and lacerations of the lower lobe of the right lung with transections, contusions and lacerations of major peri-hilar veins of the right lung. There is approximately 3000 cc of liquid and clotted right hemothorax and there are fractures of the ribs and sternum along the track of the bullet which have been described above, including the sternum and the 10th rib. There are minimal right paravertebral soft tissue hemorrhages. There is a superficial fracture of the right lateral 10th thoracic vertebra accompanied by patchy epidural hemorrhages around the thoracic and lumbar spinal medulla.

c. Recovery of the bullet [Designated 'B2']:

A moderately deformed petalized jacketed bullet is recovered embedded in the subcutaneous tissue of the right medial mid-thoracic back located 56 cm below the level of the top of the head and 6 cm right of the posterior midline accompanied by a separately lying red polymer tip. Using digital calipers, the diameter of the base of the bullet is measured in two separate planes and reveals approximate calibers of 8.91 mm and 0.349 inches. The bullet is photographed, documented and handed over to Evidence Technician [REDACTED] who is present.

d. Trajectory of the bullet:

The direction of the bullet is backward, downward and rightward.

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II. GUNSHOT WOUND OF THE LEFT ARM AND LEFT CHEST [BULLET RECOVERED]

a. Gunshot wound of entrance [Designated 'E2']:

There is a 0.7 cm in diameter circular perforating wound of the left posterolateral proximal arm located 30 cm below the level of the top of the head and 30.5 cm left of the anterior midline showing 0.1 to 0.2 cm in width red-pink circumferential marginal abrasions accentuated in the 1:00 o'clock to 5:00 o'clock clockwise positions. There are no soot deposits or powder stippling.

b. Pathway of the bullet:

The bullet perforated, contused and lacerated the skin and soft tissues of the left posterolateral proximal arm, perforated and fractured the neck of the humerus, perforated, contused and lacerated the soft tissues of the left axilla and perforated, contused and lacerated the soft tissues of the left lateral and rostral chest in the wall of the axilla where it came to settle in the subcutaneous tissue.

Accompanying the track of the bullet are minimal soft tissue hemorrhages with displaced comminuted fractures of the humerus.

c. Recovery of the bullet [Designated 'B2']:

A markedly deformed petalized jacketed bullet is recovered embedded in the subcutaneous tissue of the left antero-lateral chest in the medial wall of the left axilla located 40.7 cm below the level of the top of the head and 21.5 cm left of the anterior

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midline. The bullet is photographed, documented and handed over to the Evidence Technician [REDACTED] who is present. Using digital calipers, the diameter of the base of the bullet is measured in two separate planes and reveals approximate calibers of 0.355 inches and 8.78 mm, respectively. Eight fragments and spicules of a lead bullet and one fragment of a jacket are recovered embedded and intermingled with the comminuted fractures of the left humerus around the neck of the humerus. They are recovered photographed, documented and designated B2-F. They are also handed over to Evidence Technician [REDACTED] who is present.

d. Trajectory of the bullet:

The direction of the bullet is forward, downward and rightward.

OTHER TRAUMA:

1. There are 6 x 0.7 cm faint red-pink abrasions of the left medial upper abdominal quadrant.
2. There are 9.5 x 6 cm faint red-brown abrasions of the right lateral anterior abdomen.
3. There is a 2 x 2.1 cm in diameter tan abrasion of the right lateral proximal arm.
4. There is a 1.7 x 0.1 cm red-pink linear abrasion of the right lateral proximal arm.

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5. There are 28 x 12 cm faint blue-pink contusions of the right anteromedial forearm extending from the elbow to the wrist.
6. There are 1.9 x 0.5 cm linear abrasions of the left anteromedial proximal forearm.
7. There is a 15 x 3 cm area of multiple randomly situated brown linear abrasions of the right posterior forearm.
8. There is a 1.5 x 0.1 cm brown scabbing transverse abrasion of the right anterior wrist.
9. There are 1.6 x 0.4 cm brown abrasions of the right dorsal distal hand at the level of the second finger web.
10. There are 7 x 1 cm transverse blue-purple contusions of the left anterolateral proximal thigh.
11. There is a 2.5 x 0.1 cm red-pink linear abrasion of the left anterior and distal thigh.
12. There is a 10 x 5 cm area of multiple randomly situated brown linear abrasions of the right anterior knee and distal thigh.
13. There are 3 x 2 cm purple contusions of the left posterolateral proximal thigh.
14. There is a 24 x 9 cm area of red-purple contusions of the left anterior knee and proximal leg.

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15. There is a 17 x 3 cm area of multiple randomly situated brown linear abrasions of the right lateral leg.
16. There are 17 x 4 cm area of red-purple circular contusions of the right anterior leg comprising four distinct contusions.
17. There is a 6 x 0.1 cm oblique red-brown abrasion of the left posterior medial leg.
18. There is a 0.9 x 0.1 cm red-pink abrasion on the right posterior medial distal leg.
19. There are 3 x 1 cm red-pink abrasions of the left posterior rostral calf.
20. There are 2.5 x 0.1 cm brown abrasions of the left anteromedial ankle.
21. There are two transverse brown abrasions of the right posterior ankle measuring 0.8 x 0.1 cm and 0.7 x 0.1 cm.
22. There is a transverse brown abrasion of the left posterior ankle measuring 0.9 x 0.1 cm.
23. There is a 10 x 0.4 cm curvilinear longitudinal brown abrasion of the right medial foot.
24. There is an 11 x 5.5 cm ellipsoid longitudinal incised wound of the left anterior distal forearm and wrist with extruding and bulging muscles. The margins of the wound show multiple passes and incisions of a knife with a sharp cutting edge, around the marginal circumference of the wound. The wound comprises a roughly dissected wound passing through the soft tissues and muscles of the left forearm without incising any major blood vessel. The wound appears to be

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through and through and is contiguous with two ellipsoid longitudinal incised wounds on the left posterior distal forearm separated by a 0.2 cm in width intact skin measuring 2.5 x 0.6 cm and 2.5 x 0.8 cm for the proximal and distal wounds respectively, and both wounds are longitudinally oriented. The depth of the through and through incised wounds is approximately 7 cm. There are small amounts of organizing blood clots in the dissected incised wound in the left forearm which are collected and saved and submitted for toxicologic analyses.

25. There is a 2.5 x 1 cm ellipsoid longitudinal incised wound on the left anterior mid-forearm located approximately 1 cm from the larger ellipsoid wound in the 1 o'clock position. The wound extends in depth to the subcutaneous tissue for approximately 0.6 cm.

The head and face reveal evidence of trauma, which has been described above. The scalp hair is brown, full and measures approximately 29 cm in maximal length. The eyeballs and orbits are intact. The conjunctivae are pale and reveal no petechial hemorrhages. The corneae and sclerae are smooth and clear. The pupils are central, equal and symmetrical and measure 0.3 cm in diameter. The irises are hazel. The pinnae and external auditory meati are intact. The skeleton of the nose is intact. There is no foreign material in the nostrils or

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oral cavity. The maxillary and mandibular gums are not hypertrophied. The maxillary and mandibular teeth are natural and are in a good state of dental repair. The lips, oral mucosa and tongue reveal no evidence of trauma. The frenulae of the lips are intact.

A brown moustache and beard are present and measure approximately 3.2 cm in maximal length.

The neck is symmetrical and reveals no evidence of trauma. There is no increased mobility of the neck on manipulation.

The shoulders and chest are symmetrical and reveal evidence of trauma, which has been described above.

The abdomen is bulging and reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above.

The back is symmetrical and reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above.

The penis and scrotum are intact. There are three white plastic [REDACTED]

[REDACTED]. The testes are palpated within the scrotum and appear

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unremarkable. The ano-rectum reveals no evidence of trauma, and contains no hemorrhage or foreign material.

The extremities are symmetrical and reveal evidence of trauma, which has been described above. The fingernails are short and regular. There are no broken fingernails and there are no foreign materials beneath the fingernails. The right toenails are short and regular. There is no pitting ankle or leg edema. The palms and soles are otherwise smooth.

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INTERNAL EXAMINATION

BODY CAVITIES:

The body is opened by a "Y" shaped incision. The abdominal panniculus measures 4.2 cm in thickness, at the level of the umbilicus. The soft tissues and muscles of the chest and abdominal walls appear normal in color and consistency. There are fractures of the ribs, sternum and spine, which have been described above. The domes of the diaphragm are normally positioned. The parietal and visceral pleurae are glistening. The pleural cavities reveal evidence of trauma, which has been described above. The right pleural cavity is moist and contains no blood. The peritoneum is smooth and thin. The peritoneal cavity is moist. The liver and spleen do not extend below the costal margins. The bladder lies below the level of the pubic symphysis. The organs of the pleural and peritoneal cavities are in the normal anatomic positions in relation to one another in-situ. The mesentery and omentum are unremarkable. The pulmonary artery is opened in-situ and no thrombo-emboli are seen.

At this time, cut down incisions are made in the right and left femoral triangles. There is minimal femoral venous blood present. Representative samples of the pericardial blood and right chest blood are taken and saved. Representative samples of urine, bile and vitreous humor are taken and saved.

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Under an aseptic protocol, samples of heart blood are taken and saved for blood culture.

CARDIOVASCULAR SYSTEM:

The heart weighs 340 grams. The pericardium reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above. The pericardial cavity reveals hemopericardium, which has been described above. The epicardial surface reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above. There is a moderate amount of epicardial fat. The external configuration of the heart is within normal limits. The walls of the ventricles are not hypertrophied. The atrioventricular chambers show mild bilateral and symmetrical dilatation. The endocardium reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above. The endocardium and valve leaflets reveal no thrombi or vegetations. The circumferences of the valves are as follows: tricuspid 12.9 cm; pulmonic 7.1 cm; mitral 9.9 cm; and aortic 7.0 cm. The trabeculae carneae and papillary muscles are not hypertrophied. The chordae tendineae are non-sclerotic. The wall of the right ventricle measures 0.5 cm in greatest thickness. The wall of the left ventricle measures 1.5 cm in greatest thickness. The interventricular septum measures 1.4 cm in greatest thickness. The coronary arteries exhibit a normal anatomic distribution with a right predominance. The right and left coronary ostia are patent. Multiple cut sections of the coronary arteries at 1.0

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cm intervals reveal severe eccentric and segmental atherosclerosis of the left coronary artery mainstem with focal 90% intraluminal occlusion. The right coronary artery reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above and the residual right coronary artery shows perivascular soft tissue hemorrhages. The myocardium is firm, red-brown and reveals contusions and lacerations, which have been described above. The sinoatrial and atrioventricular nodes appear intact.

The aorta shows patchy para-aortic soft tissue hemorrhages of the descending thoracic aorta and reveals minimal atheromatous streaking with no ulceration or calcification. The internal carotid arteries are patent. The bifurcation of the common iliac arteries is patent. The major veins show no thrombo-emboli. The venae cavae are unremarkable.

RESPIRATORY SYSTEM:

The right lung weighs 280 grams and the left lung weighs 760 grams. The right lung reveals evidence of trauma, which has been described above. The trachea shows a smooth congested red-tan mucosa. The lungs are distended and are variegated pink-red to gray-purple. The left lung is distended. The lung parenchyma is of spongy consistency and mottled with a moderate amount of anthracotic pigment. Multiple cut sections exhibit a variegated red-pink to gray-purple to red-purple, non-crepitant, parenchyma

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with parenchymal contusions and lacerations of the lower lobe of the right lung, which have been described above. The lung parenchyma is severely congested and edematous. No purulent exudate is expressed from the parenchyma on compression.

The extra- and intra-pulmonary bronchi are opened longitudinally, are patent, congested and contain sero-mucoid fluid. The pulmonary arteries are intact. The right pulmonary veins reveal evidence of trauma, which has been described above. There is no peri-hilar or mediastinal lymphadenopathy.

HEPATOBIILIARY SYSTEM:

The liver weighs 1300 grams. The capsule of Glisson is smooth and transparent. The external surfaces are brown-red, smooth and glistening. The borders are sharp. The parenchyma is soft, brown-red and shows a lobular tissue architecture without hemorrhages, tumors or necrosis.

The gallbladder reveals thin walls and a velvety mucosa. It contains approximately 12 cc of yellow-green bile without gallstones. The intra- and extra-hepatic biliary ducts are patent. The hepatic and portal veins and the hepatic artery are intact.

HEMOLYMPHATIC SYSTEM:

The spleen weighs 160 grams and is of a normal consistency. The capsule is glistening and smooth. The corpuscles of Malpighii are blurred. The

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parenchyma is red-purple and homogeneous. There is no central or peripheral lymphadenopathy. An involuted thymus is found in the superior mediastinum and appears unremarkable.

GASTROINTESTINAL SYSTEM:

The esophagus contains no foreign material or regurgitated gastric contents, and reveals no focal mucosal lesions. There are surrounding soft tissue hemorrhages around the esophagus accompanying the soft tissue hemorrhages around the aorta. The stomach contains approximately 350 cc of mushy white-brown viscid fluid admixed with amorphous white-gray pieces of food which are not identifiable. There are no drug-residues, pills or capsules. The mucosa of the stomach reveals rugal folds without peptic or stress ulcerations. The duodenum, jejunum, ileum and colon reveal unremarkable serosal surfaces without segmental stenosis or infarction. The vermiform appendix is identified and shows no gross inflammation. The retroperitoneum is unremarkable.

ENDOCRINE SYSTEM:

The pancreas weighs 110 grams. The parenchyma is gray-pink and homogeneous, and shows a lobular, septated parenchyma without hemorrhages or necrosis.

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The adrenal glands reveal the normal shapes and sizes. Multiple cut sections reveal thin yellow-tan cortices and brown-tan medullae without hyperplasia, hemorrhage or adenoma.

The thyroid gland weighs 20 grams. The parenchyma is red-brown and homogenous.

UROGENITAL SYSTEM:

The kidneys are in the normal anatomic positions and reveal no anomalies. The right kidney weighs 110 grams and the left kidney weighs 110 grams. The capsular surfaces are smooth and glistening. The capsules strip with ease and reveal smooth brown surfaces. The cortices are not sclerotic, are brown-red and homogeneous. The medullary pyramids are intact. The cortico-medullary junctions are well-defined. The renal papillae show no hemorrhage or necrosis. The calyces and pelves are not dilated. The renal arteries and veins are unremarkable.

The ureters are not dilated or obstructed.

The bladder contains approximately 75 cc of white-yellow urine and reveals a smooth, tan-pink mucosa with no papillary lesions. The ureteral orifices are patent.

The internal genitalia, including the prostate, vas deferens and epididymis, appear unremarkable.

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MUSCULOSKELETAL SYSTEM:

There are no musculoskeletal anomalies. There is evidence of musculoskeletal trauma, which has been described above. The muscles are well-developed and of the normal color and consistency without sarcopenia. The spinal column and vertebral bodies reveal no marked gross osteo-degenerative changes. The sternum, ribs, and spine exhibit the expected bone density. The bone marrow reveals no gross nodules.

NECK:

The soft tissues of the neck and the anterior strap muscles show no hemorrhages. The thyroid and cricoid cartilages, larynx, and hyoid bone show no fractures. The larynx reveals a congested red-pink mucosa and contains no frothy fluid. There are no paralaryngeal or paratracheal hemorrhages or masses. There is no foreign material in the upper or lower airway. The epiglottis and vocal cords are red-pink and intact.

CENTRAL NERVOUS SYSTEM:

The scalp is reflected from mastoid process to mastoid process and reveals no subcutaneous or subgaleal hemorrhage. The calvarium is intact without fractures. Upon removal of the calvarium, there are no epidural or subdural hemorrhages or exudates. The dura mater is white, smooth, and does

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not exhibit any xanthochromia or membranes. The leptomeninges are smooth and glistening.

The brain weighs 1580 grams and is fixed in formalin together with the pituitary gland and dura mater to be examined on a later date [see forensic neuropathology report- attached].

The pituitary gland is found in sella turcica and both appear intact.

The dura covering the vault and the base of the cranium is removed and reveals an intact base of the skull without fractures.

The dens, atlanto-axial joint, atlanto-occipital joint and cervical intervertebral joints are intact without fractures, subluxation or soft tissue hemorrhages.

Using an anterior approach, the laminae of the cervical, thoracic and lumbar spine are incised to gain access into the spinal canal. There are epidural hemorrhages in the spinal canal, which have been described above, otherwise the cervical, thoracic and lumbar spine are intact. The spinal medulla is fixed in formalin together with the brain to be examined on a later date.

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MICROSCOPIC EXAMINATION

Microscopic examination of submitted tissue histology sections reveals histo-morphologic findings that are consistent with the gross findings and final pathologic diagnoses, which have been stated above. The tissue histology sections have been archived as part of the case records and will be made available upon request.

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GROSS DESCRIPTION

DURA MATER:

Multiple irregular pieces of dorsal and posterior dura mater are received on the neuropathology bench. The epidural and subdural surfaces are smooth and white-tan and show no calcifications, xanthochromia, membranes or hemorrhages. The falx cerebri, tentorium cerebelli, diaphragma sellae and the tentorial notch (incisure) are identified and are unremarkable. The infratentorial and supratentorial compartments contain no space-occupying lesion or tumor. The dural venous sinuses are identified and appear patent without intraluminal thromboemboli.

BRAIN:

The weight of the formaldehyde fixed brain is 1598 grams. The brain stem and cerebellum weigh 217 grams. The anthropometric dimensions of the brain appear consistent with a well-developed adult brain. The surfaces of the brain reveal no gross malformations. The cerebral hemispheres appear symmetrical and reveal a pattern of gyral and sulcal convolutions that appears within normal limits. There is diffuse symmetrical expansion of gyri and compression of sulci, accompanied by bilateral symmetrical grooving of the unci and cerebellar tonsils without necrosis. There is bilateral symmetrical compression of the basal subarachnoidal cisterns, which contain no exudate or hemorrhage.

The arachnoid and pia mater appear smooth and glistening in the dorsal and basal hemispheric surfaces and show no hemorrhages or exudates. The vessels of the Circle of Willis and the Basilar-Vertebral arteries are identified and reveal no anomalies, significant atherosclerosis, or aneurysm. The cranial nerves are identified and appear intact, without any tumor or atrophy. There is no olfactory aplasia. There are no optic nerve subdural hemorrhages.

A mid-coronal section at the level of the mamillary bodies is made exposing the anterior midbrain and cerebral peduncles. A transverse axial section is made at the level of the posterior commissure separating the brainstem and cerebellum from the diencephalon (thalami) and telencephalon (cerebral hemispheres). Multiple serial coronal sections are made at 1 – 2 cm intervals from the occipital pole to the frontal pole. The neocortical gray ribbon is distinct and reveals no gross cortical dysplasia, hemorrhage, or necrosis. The gray-white matter demarcation is distinct. The centrum semiovale and the periventricular

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white matter reveal central congestion and edema without demyelination, necrosis, or hemorrhage. There is no periventricular leukomalacia.

The ventricles are symmetrically compressed and contain no hemorrhage or exudate. The ependymal lining is smooth and glistening. There is no intraventricular obstruction. The cerebral aqueduct of Sylvius appears patent. The foramen of Magendie and foramina of Lushka are patent. The choroid plexuses are congested. The septum pellucidum, the lamina terminalis, superior and inferior medullary vela appear intact. The genu, body, and splenium of the corpus callosum are intact and reveal no atrophy, focal necrosis, or hemorrhage.

The claustrum, caudate nucleus, putamen, globus pallidus, thalamus and subthalamic nucleus reveal no atrophy, hemorrhage, or necrosis. The internal, external, and extreme capsules are intact and show no necrosis or hemorrhage. The anterior perforated substance shows no atrophy, focal necrosis, or hemorrhage. The amygdala and the piriform cortex reveal no atrophy, focal necrosis, or hemorrhage. The hippocampus and parahippocampal gyrus reveal no gross dysplasia, hemorrhage, necrosis, or atrophy. The mamillary bodies and hypothalamus reveal no atrophy, hemorrhage or xanthochromia.

The brain stem is separated from the cerebellum at the cerebellar peduncles and multiple transverse sections of the caudal and rostral midbrain, pons, and medulla oblongata, reveal no focal necrosis or hemorrhage. There are no dorsolateral hemorrhages or necrosis. There is no hemorrhagic collicular necrosis. The cerebral peduncles and medullary pyramids show no atrophy, focal necrosis, or hemorrhage. The substantia nigra and locus ceruleus appear adequately pigmented for age. The midbrain tegmentum, pontine tegmentum and medullary tegmentum reveal no focal necrosis or hemorrhage. The basis pontis shows no central myelinolysis, necrosis or hemorrhage. The inferior olivary nuclei show the expected convolitional pattern without any focal necrosis or hemorrhage.

The cerebellar hemispheres are symmetrical and reveal no malformation. There is no folial or vermal atrophy. The primary fissure and the posterolateral fissures are identified as well as the flocculonodular, anterior and posterior lobes. Multiple sagittal sections of the cerebellum reveal no gross cortical dysplasia. There is no necrosis of the internal granule cell layer. The cerebellar white matter shows diffuse edema and congestion without any focal necrosis or hemorrhage. The fastigial, globose, emboliform, and dentate nuclei show the

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expected convolitional patterns without focal necrosis or hemorrhage. The inferior (restiform body), middle (brachium pontis) and the superior (brachium conjunctivum) cerebellar peduncles reveal no atrophy, necrosis, or hemorrhage.

PITUITARY GLAND:

A 1.5 x 0.7 x 0.3 cm of a pituitary gland is submitted with an attached segment of infundibular stalk. A mid-transverse section is made and reveals red-tan homogeneous solid tissue without gross adenoma, hemorrhage, or necrosis.

SPINAL CORD:

A 44 x 1.0 cm segment of a spinal cord is received with attached dura mater. The dorsal and ventral roots and the dorsal root ganglia are identified and appear unremarkable. The dura mater and arachnoid mater reveal no epidural, subdural or subarachnoid hemorrhages or exudates. There is no segmental necrosis or atrophy. Multiple transverse sections of the spinal medulla at 1-2 cm intervals reveal unremarkable central spinal canal, anterior and posterior horns of the gray matter, intermediate gray matter, anterior white commissure, substantia gelatinosa and the intermediolateral cell column. The white matter appears unremarkable revealing the fasciculi gracilis and cuneatus, anterior and lateral funiculi, without gross degeneration, necrosis, or hemorrhage. There is no central gray matter contusional hemorrhage or necrosis.

MICROSCOPIC DESCRIPTION

The arachnoid mater reveals no inflammation. There is congestion of the arachnoidal blood vessels with multifocal perivascular microextravasates, without perivascular or vascular inflammation.

Examination of H/E-stained sections of the neocortex reveals a homogenetic cortex with the normal homotypical laminar and columnar organization. There is no cortical disorganization, diffuse or nodular neuronal heterotopia. There is no significant neuronal dropout. There are many scattered pyknotic and amphophilic to eosinophilic neocortical neurons. There is perineuronal vacuolation, accompanied by diffuse expansion of Virchow Robin spaces and neuropil microspangiosis in both the gray and white mater. The pia mater, penetrating vessels and the Virchow Robin's spaces reveal no inflammation. There is congestion of the penetrating parenchymal blood vessels with multifocal perivascular microextravasates.

The centrum semiovale and corpus callosum reveal neuropil edema and congestion without demyelination or infarct. There is no periventricular leukomalacia. The subependymal white matter is non-gliotic and the ependymal cells show no inflammation. Several penetrating parenchymal blood vessels show sparse perivascular mononuclear leukocytes and hemosiderin-laden histiocytes.

The dentate gyrus and cornu ammonis of the hippocampus reveal neuropil edema and congestion with no focal dysplasia or sclerosis. The stratum pyramidalis of the Sommer's sector (CA1), CA2, CA3 and CA4 regions of the cornu ammonis reveal many pyknotic and amphophilic to eosinophilic pyramidal neurons in the Sommer's sector. The entorhinal cortex and the alveus reveal no focal necrosis. The internal, external, and extreme capsules reveal diffuse neuropil edema without focal microinfarcts. The amygdala, claustrum, caudate nucleus, putamen, globus pallidus and thalamus reveal

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neuropil edema and congestion with few scattered pyknotic and amphophilic to eosinophilic neurons without lacunar infarcts. There is no mineralization of the walls of the vessels of the globus pallidus or hippocampus.

There are neuropil edema and congestion of the midbrain, pons, and medulla oblongata without any focal neuropil inflammation. The midbrain tectum and tegmentum, and the periaqueductal gray matter reveal several pyknotic and amphophilic to eosinophilic neurons. The substantia nigra (pars reticularis and pars compacta) and locus ceruleus reveal mild pigmenti incontinentia. There is no dorsolateral or collicular necrosis or hemorrhage. The cerebral peduncles and medullary pyramids show no atrophy or focal necrosis. The basis pontis shows no central myelinolysis, hemorrhage, demyelination, or necrosis. The pontine and medullary tegmental nuclei and pontine nuclei show several scattered pyknotic and amphophilic to eosinophilic neurons. The inferior olivary nuclei show several scattered pyknotic and amphophilic to eosinophilic neurons.

The cerebellar cortex and white matter reveal neuropil edema and vascular congestion. The Purkinje neurons show many pyknotic, amphophilic to eosinophilic neurons. The internal granule cell layer shows no necrosis. The dentate nucleus shows many pyknotic, amphophilic to eosinophilic neurons. The cerebellar white matter shows no focal necrosis or infarct.

Examination of H/E-stained sections of the pituitary gland reveals the adenohypophysis with the polymorphous admixture of acidophilic, basophilic cells and chromophobes without infarcts or adenoma. The adenohypophysial sinusoids are congested. The dura mater reveals no inflammation or fibrocytic membranes and no extradural foamy or pigment-laden histiocytes.

The cervical, thoracic, and lumbar segments of the spinal medulla reveal the normal gray and white matter morphology with the anterior and posterior horns and intermediate gray matter. The laminae of Rexed, the lissauer's tract, substantia gelatinosa, intermediolateral cell column and Clark's nucleus are identified and appear unremarkable. The spinal canal is central and unremarkable with the anterior white commissure. The anterior horn cells appear within normal limits without significant neuronal drop out. The white matter funiculi and tracts appear unremarkable without evidence of trauma, degeneration or dysmyelination including the fasciculi cuneatus and gracilis, the lateral and anterior funiculi. The dura mater and arachnoid mater reveal no inflammation or hemorrhage.

Examination of tau immunostained sections of all the immunostained sections reveal no neurofibrillary tangles or neuropil threads, no Lewy bodies or Lewy neurites, no amyloid plaques, no TDP-43 inclusions or neurites. There is mild diffuse isomorphic astrogliosis in the bilateral amygdala. There are few CD68 immunopositive histiocytes in many Virchow Robin spaces accentuated in the basis pontis which shows many CD68-immunopositive histiocytes in many Virchow Robin spaces accompanied by none to sparse neurofibrillary tangle and neuropil threads in the locus ceruleus.
